## **Catholics Least Where Population Explodes**

Cincinnati — (RNS) — Roman Catholics through-out the vorld totaled 527,653,000 as of last June 30, or 18.3 per cent of the population — an increase of one-tenth of one per cent.

According to this year's World Mission Map of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade here, the gain in the total number of Catholics from mid-1958 to mid-1959 amounted to over 17 million. The increase in the total world population was 88,976,000, making the new total 2,886,691,000. This raised the Catholic percentage from 18.2 to 18.3.

No new trends in Catholic population were shown on the map, but the regions of most rapid Catholic growth -- chiefly West, Central, and East Africa, the African Islands, and North America - continued to show gains.

In the two regions of heaviest total population --Eastern and South-Central Asia - the Church continued to hold its own percentage-wise, at .5 and 1.3 per cent, respectively. These two areas count slightly today no longer stands in the loce than 47 ner cent of the total world population. shadow."
