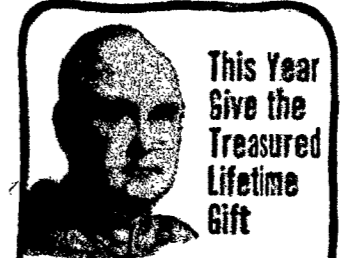

It's Fruitcake For Christmas

It isn't Christmas to me unless I bake fruit cake. It adds so much to the joyousness of the season. And there's a good time in the making, pleasure in giving it for gifts, and the hospitality in serving it to friends when they drop in. If you are one of those people who has shopping, have a dreadful time trying to decide what to send Aunt Jessie or Uncle my taste. Every year I make many pounds of this cake. I decorate and wrap them in clear cellophane, bright Christmas paper. They will surely appreciate it and you will doubly enjoy it, if you make it. It also makes an ideal round gift to send to friends or relatives away at school or in the definitely in them.

BEST DARK FRUIT CAKE

Table with 3 columns: For 5 pounds, Ingredients, For 15 pounds. Lists ingredients like mixed candied fruits, white raisins, seedless raisins, currants, walnuts, flour, etc.

Select and grease pans. Line with heavy waxed paper. Beat egg yolks, one at a time, with heavy waxed paper. Add molasses and jam. Add flour mixture alternately with fruit juice or brandy, beat for 15 pounds. Combine fruiting well. Stir in the fruit-nut mixture. Whip egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold into batter. Turn into prepared pans. Sprinkle with sugar and salt together. Bake in a very slow oven Cream sugar and shortening, as per chart.



It is wise to have scales top weigh cakes before baking. If you do not know size of pan or how much weight it will hold. To help you, the following parts of water and the market are wonderful. The smallest loaf size will hold 1 pound of batter, the next loaf size will hold 2 pounds. Coffee cans are good and will hold 1 pound of cake. Canned cherries and almonds or other nuts and glaze the top again with the hot corn syrup mixture. Wrap the decorated fruit cakes in aluminum foil before you wrap them in their bright Christmas paper. Top the packages with a perky bow, and you'll have a most tasty Christmas gift that will be welcomed by one and all.

Once the cakes have cooled, wrap them in waxed paper and aluminum foil and store them in a tightly covered container. When you're ready to decorate them, glaze the tops of the cakes with a mixture of equal parts of water and light corn syrup which has been boiled vigorously for one minute. They are busier than bees at this time of year—so to avoid a long wait in line for what you need, call them up a day or so ahead of time, then you will have no delay in picking them up. Sonyea Boy Ten Years College Prexy

A lad from Sonyea will mark his tenth year as head of Jersey City's St. Peter's College next Thursday, Dec. 3. He is the Very Rev. James J. Shanahan, Jesuit son of the late Dr. and Mrs. William T. Shanahan. He was named fifteenth president of St. Peter's College, Dec. 3, 1949. Jesuit run school at Sonyea from 1909 to 1943. His articles, published in medical journals and in the Encyclopedia Britannica, are still recognized as basic in the study of epilepsy. FATHER SHANAHAN, born in 1907, was baptized and later made his first solemn Mass at Sonyea's Chapel of the Divine Compassion. Since his first Mass there in 1939, Father Shanahan has served as an Air Force Chaplain during World War II, and retains a strong interest in the ROTC program at the college. He was elected by the New Jersey Association of Colleges and Universities to be its president and has served in other state-wide college groups. A testimonial dinner will be held at Hotel Roosevelt in New York City Tuesday, Dec. 1, to honor him. Father Robert I. Gannon, noted Jesuit orator, will be the guest speaker.

Off The Record Plunkety-Plunk

Well, here's rock 'n roll in the program continues sounds and music serving as links between the full-length Christmas songs and carols. For a more serious approach to the Christmas season, "The Spirit Of Christmas" by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir on Columbia is the best bet. It contains all the old favorite carols and some of the not-so-often-heard Christmas songs. And of course the magnificent six-part choir adds majesty and elegance to all selections. "Christmas With Conniff" on Columbia is an album of all the popular Christmas songs. In the usual bright Conniff style, orchestra and chorus bounce through the album with a happy seasonal spirit. The arrangement of this song is fine with flutes, strings, chorus and good rhythm until that old rock 'n roll piano plunkety-plunk snags in and makes it sound like every other record on the market. The melody itself goes nowhere. It's neither particularly good nor particularly bad. The other side of the record, "C'est Serieux" (It's Serious) is a little better. It's not a rocker. As a matter of fact it has a swingin' beat and a rather catchy melody. The fascinating thing about the record is the French lyric. It's almost always better when you don't know what the lyrics mean because they make so little sense when you do know. Pallette label released a couple of cute novelties this week. "French Horns In Buckingham Palace" and "Ticker Tape Parade" by Johnny Armenteer and his Orchestra. Both are march tempos and scored for full orchestra. They contain a bright, happy, full sound and remind one of a pops concert type of novelty. I'm sure this record will go nowhere—it's too good. For those who collect original cast albums and missed "Li Abner," here's another chance. Columbia has just released the sound track from the movie "Li' Abner." It's the same wonderful score as it was heard on Broadway. SINCE CHRISTMAS is approaching, here's a few tips for those who are planning to add some Christmas albums to their collections. "The Sounds Of Christmas" by Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians on Capitol. The record opens with the whistle and chug of a train bearing passengers home for the holidays.
