Vespers Listed By Capri Club

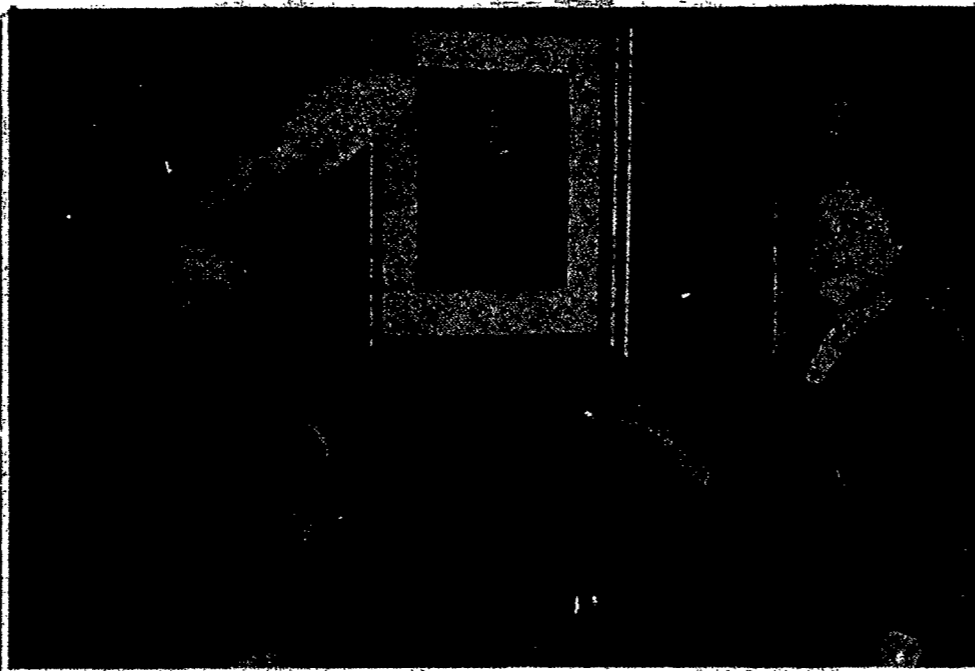

Dutch Priests Propose Changes In Church Rites

The Hague — (NC) — Increased use of vernacular languages in Catholic worship would be a big contribution toward bringing people closer to the Word of God, according to two Dutch priests who are prominent in the movement for Christian unity.

The two priests, Msgr. J. G. M. Willebrands and Father J. Thijssen, spoke of the ecumenical council and of approaches to Christian reunion in addresses they gave at a congress of the St. Adalbert Association, Dutch organization of Catholic intellectuals.

Father Thijssen told the congress that rubrics should be changed so that the whole of the Mass is recited by the priest, audibly and clearly. He indicated that the present requirement for the prayers of the

Canon of the Mass to be recited in a low voice hinders the full participation of the congregation in the Mass.

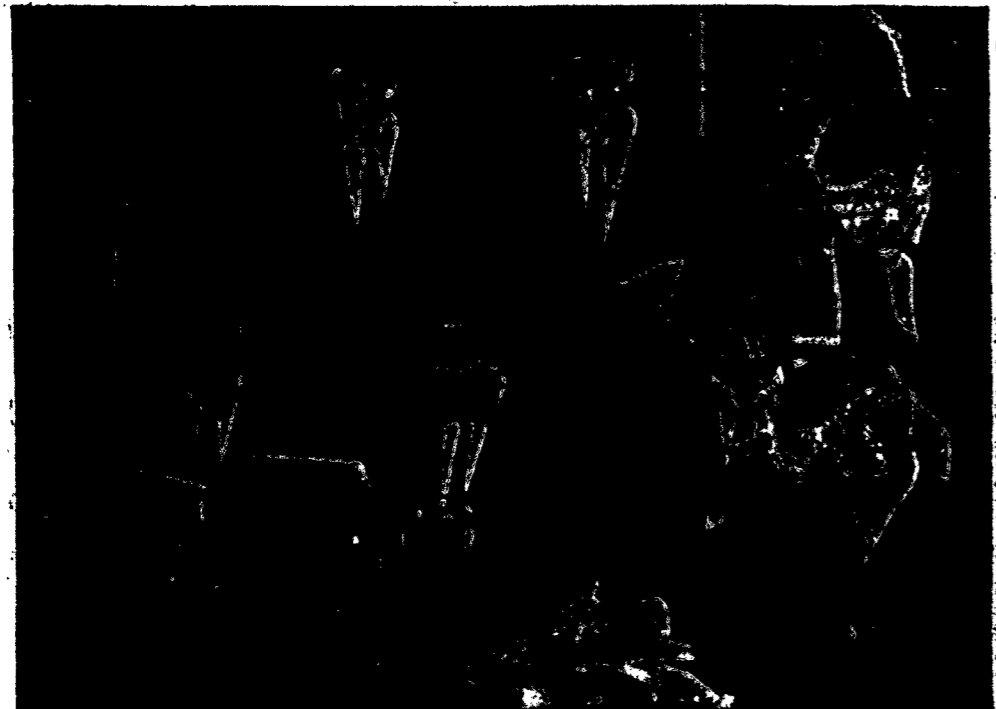
