Three Retreat Masses Set

Catholic men of the Rochester Diocese received a plea for prayers (Dec. 30) from Bishop Kearney. The Bishop appealed to the men to unite their prayers at one of three special diocesan Retreat Masses scheduled simultaneously for 8 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 5.

Masses will be offered in Rochester, Lima and Geneva to seek the blessings of God for the success of the 1960 Retreat year at Notre Dame Retreat House, 246 Alexander St., Rochester.

AT ST. JOSEPH'S Church in Rochester, Bishop Kearney will celebrate a Pontifical Mass and deliver a sermon on the spiritual rewards that come to those who make retreats.

A Solemn Mass will be celebrated at St. Rose's Church, Lima, by the Rev. Thomas Fallon, C.S.S.R. Retreat Master at Notre Dame Retreat House.

The Rev. William Jamison, C.S.S.R., will celebrate a Solemn Mass at St. Mary's Church in Corning.

Linking the success of the retreat year with attendance at the opening Mass, Bishop Kearney urged that more men from Rochester assist at the St. Joseph's Mass and retreat Holy Communion.

He said that well-attended Retreat Masses in Geneva and Corning last year helped boost the number of retreatants from outside the city.

THOSE PLANNING to receive Holy Communion at the evening Mass were reminded that they must fast for three hours from solid food and alcoholic beverages and one hour from liquids, except water.

The third annual Retreat Masses are being arranged by the Laymen's Retreat League which has 3,446 members, according to the Rev. William Jamison, moderator.

The league was formed in 1915 when a small group of men began making one summer weekend retreat at St. Bernard's Seminary. Forty-eight weekend retreats are now held each year at Notre Dame Retreat House, Father Jamison's.

Looking Back

Holy Name Society Early Days Recalled

Holy Name men of the Monroe County area will be gathering at St. Joseph's Church, Sunday at 10:30 a.m. for Pontifical Mass to be celebrated by Bishop Kearney. A few memories of previous Holy Name Society gatherings come to mind.

Earliest recollection of this Society which is devoted to the Holy Name of Jesus is a parade back in the Teens of this century. Forming out East Main St., we marched over the cobblestones which were hardly conducive to walking, out West Ave. then to St. Mary's Boys Home.

There on the grounds Benediction was celebrated and the procession was brought to an end.

A BIT PRIOR to that time while in high school, this writer was elected president of the Junior Holy Name Society in St. Patrick's Cathedral parish. A banquet was in order and the president was asked to speak.

Public speaking was tortuous for me. I had hardly recited in classes. However, William Murray, now in Alameda, California, and former mayor of that city was in high school with us and said he would write the speech. He was a law student at the time. The speech was excellent but we found out later that he had recited the third paragraph for the second and generally had it mixed up.

Prior to 1932 the Holy Name Society had been operating only on a parish basis. The late Monsignor F. William Stauder of Holy Redeemer parish called a meeting of parish representatives in Columbus Civic Center dining room where the Chancery is now and a Diocesan Holy Name Union came into existence. Monsignor Stauder was not only the sparkplug of this organization but also of the Holy Name Bowling Tournament which has become such an extensive activity for bowlers and Holy Name men.

THE IDEA OF a Holy Name Society for Policemen and other law enforcement officers came later and Monsignor John S. Randall has been moderator since. The Fire Bureau has its society and the Post Office employees also with various lodges, through the years.

Holy Name rallies at Red Wing Stadium, Aqueduct and St. Ann's, Elmira, come to mind as do diocesan conventions. I remember that Norman A. O'Brien, attorney, then diocesan president, drove me to St. Joseph, Wayland, for a successful meeting there.

In promoting previous Holy Name activities inevitably we would write "a public demonstration of faith." There is no doubt that seeing Catholic men assembled in church or on the way there or in rallies in public places that it becomes edifying to all onlookers.
