Maryknoll Priest, Native Of Geneva Reports On Mission In Philippines

GEMINI — When his jeep got stuck in the mud, a young Geneva priest, who is a Maryknoll missioner in the Philippines, had to get out and push and finally wound up by being pulled out by carabao.

The Rev. Francis Taney, M.M., son of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Taney of 58 Evans St., writes of his interesting experiences and describes some of his mission activities in a new letter to the Rev. Daniel Torney of St. Francis de Sales parish.

A FORMER member of the local parish, Father Taney was ordained last year and his first mission assignment was to the Island of Mindanao in the Philippines. He is stationed at Christ the King Church, Tagum, Maguindanao.

"Last Saturday I was in one of our barrio-chapels in Maco when I noticed a comodona in the street outside. A man had just been stabbed below the heart by a Moro. Fortunately, I had my sick-call set with me and this baptized Catholic was able to receive Extreme Unction before he died.
