BORN in Rochester, Mr. O'Brien was educated at Holy Trinity and West High Schools, St. Bonaventure University and Syracuse Law School. Surviving are a son, Noel, a Naval Reserve aviator assigned to the USS Scaevon, a daughter, Miss Gill Ann O'Brien, a teacher at Immaculate High School, and two sons and two grandsons.
