Versatile Meat Loaf

Ever wonder what to do with leftovers? We all as homemakers face this problem and we often have to stretch our imagination to think up new ways to spruce up the remnants of yesterday's dinner. You really don't have to disguise the leftovers; you just have to make the next dish so appealing that the family will not think of it as a leftover. Let's say it's planned over.

An ideal dish for budget-conscious cooks, this is a dish that will lend itself to a "planned over" menu. The word versatile describes many cuts of meat but there's one outstanding choice... ground meats. If you're to be cut on the basis of popularity, hamburgers would win a landslide victory. Just ask your youngsters.

GROUND MEATS are favorites as meat loaves or meat balls. For variety ground meat mixtures may be baked in ring molds or muffin pans or made into stuffings for squash, green peppers or eggplant. Think too of ground meat for spaghetti and noodles or rice. Just can't be beat.

Here's a recipe for an elegant meat loaf, but this time it's not beef but ground ham that takes the spot light. It's adaptable for second day dishes too. This recipe will serve 10 to 12 persons, so if your family is small there will be some left over for the "planned over" meal. Wonderful just cold for sandwiches too. The aroma while baking this Candelied Ham Loaf is tantalizing. Your family are sure to ask "What's cooking Mom!"

- CANDED HAM LOAF**
- 2 pounds ground ham
 - 1 pound ground beef
 - 3 c. stale (not dry) bread crumbs
 - 1 c. milk
 - 2 eggs, slightly beaten
 - 1 t. dry mustard
 - 1/2 t. salt
 - 1/2 c. brown sugar
 - 1/2 c. ground cloves

When the meat is chilled it can be cut into small cubes, stuck on toothpicks and used as hors d'oeuvres. Serve it along with stuffed olives, small onions and other relishes. Remember when you store cooked meat or meat dishes in the refrigerator, keep them tightly covered. This helps to keep the moisture in.

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PEANUT BUTTER SAUCE

1/2 pk. chocolate pudding mix
1/2 c. water

Combine pudding mix, water and corn syrup. Mix well. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture begins to boil. Remove from heat, add butter, peanut butter and vanilla. Stir until melted. Serve warm over ice cream. Makes 1 1/2 c. Store any left over sauce in a tightly covered jar in the refrigerator. When reheating to serve warm it's a good idea to use a double boiler. If sauce becomes too thick you may add a little hot water.

All The Cats Are Catholics

Alice, An Old-Time Protestant

Lakewood, O. (RNS) — Alice in Wonderland, that classical children's volume, is more than a fairy tale—it is really a symbolic story of religion in 19th century England, according to an Episcopal minister here who has just finished a seven-year analysis of the work.

"Alice really is a Protestant, and the whole point of the book is her love and tolerance and Carroll's condemnation of the church schisms and squabbles of his day," asserts Dr. W. Chave McCracken, of St. Peter's church.

"Carroll's masterpiece of nonsense will outlive any interpretation," he said. "But there is no doubt that church controversies, childhood memories and repressed psychologic tensions found their outlet in the spinning of the tale." It was published in 1865, when Carroll, whose real name was the Rev. Charles Lutwidge Dodgson, was 33.

Although the author was a lecturer in mathematics at Oxford, Dr. McCracken pointed out, it just is remembered that Carroll was the son of an Anglican minister and the grandson of a bishop who was very much in the center of religious controversy.

HUMPTY DUMPTY, according to the Lakewood pastor, represents the traditional Protestant interpretation of the Bible. Once modern Biblical criticism entered the scene, it did not long before the king's horse and all the king's men could not put the Bible back together again as it had once been understood.

Alice in one scene is more than nine feet tall, with her head in the clouds and unable to see her own feet. "Is she a Catholic or a Protestant, doesn't matter," Dr. McCracken wondered. He found a clue in Alice's remark upon remembering her geography: "Rome is all wrong."

In the poem, "How Doth the Little Crocodile," which Alice recites, Dr. McCracken sees the crocodile as the Catholic Church getting such converts as John Henry Cardinal Newman, William George Ward, theologian of the English Catholic revival.

Philosophers Magazine

New York — (NC) — The first issue of the new International Philosophy Quarterly will be published in September after two years of preparation, a Fordham University official has announced.

Father James M. Somerville, S.J., chairman of the graduate department of philosophy at the Jesuit institution, said the publication will mark the appearance of the first and only full-scale international review of philosophy in the English language.

Halt Atom Tests Ghana Appeals

Rome — (RNS) — Ghana has asked the Vatican to use its influence to prevent French nuclear tests in the Sahara, according to Italia, news agency of the Christian Democratic Party.

In its appeal, Ghana quoted statements by both Pope John XXIII and his predecessor Pope Pius XII calling for peaceful rather than military use of nuclear energy.

THE APPEAL coincides with a joint protest by 145 Italian scientists against the French tests. The scientists warned that the tests endanger not only the lives of African populations surrounding the Sahara, but also people in Italy proper, because of windborne fallout.

Messinville, ANSA, Italian news agency, here issued another statement opposing the tests.

Belgium here to have been inspired by Father A. Massiani, S.J., a well-known authority on international affairs. The statement claimed that Italian Catholics disapprove of the projected tests as "criminal." It also said that France should solve its own grave problems with the help of other nations instead of antagonizing them. This was seen by observers here as a reference to the situation in North Africa.

Chicago — (NC) — Lt. Gen. Arthur G. Trudeau, chief of general staff, will address the fourth annual Festival of Leadership scholarship banquet February 1.

The event is a fund-raising one to help finance the education of 300 boys studying for the priesthood in seminaries of the Carmelite Order.

South Orange — (NC) — Eddie Coppola, Seton Hall University and Prep School athletic trainer since 1946, has been elected president of the National College Trainers Association.

More Than Billion For New Churches

Washington — (RNS) — Church construction will exceed one billion dollars in 1960, the department of Commerce predicted here in its annual report on the outlook for the construction industry.

If this optimistic forecast comes true, it will be the first billion-dollar year in history for erection of religious edifices.

Church construction set a new all-time mark of \$935,000,000 in 1959, according to a year-end estimate of the U.S. Census Bureau.

FREE CONSTRUCTION industry division of the Department of Commerce believes that building activity in this field will increase to \$1,000,000,000 in 1960.


There also will be a substantial upturn in building activity by the nation's non-public schools and colleges, many of which are church-related, the department of Commerce predicted.
