

## Voters Give Kerala Reds Sound Defeat In Election

New Delhi — (RNS) — Kerala's Communist Party, whose education policy was steadfastly fought by Roman Catholic, Moslem and Hindu communities in the state, won a 3-to-1 smashing defeat in the general election for the Legislative Assembly.

The Reds gained only 23 out of 126 seats in the state assembly, while the three-party United Democratic Front won 95. Three other seats were captured by independents.

Weeks before the election, it was the only Indian state where state's 3,000,000 Catholics had the Reds had gained power.

## Chapel

Boston — (RNS) — The new chapel and information unit at the North Shore Shopping Center in Boston will serve some 3,600 employees of nearby stores and an estimated 25,000 shoppers daily. The unit is believed to be the first of its kind erected in a shopping plaza. Richard Cardinal Cushing, Archbishop of Boston, who donated \$10,000 toward the cost, said the project is another step in his long-range plan of "bringing the church to the people."

## Rescued On Suicide Brink

Boston — (NC) — Some 1,000 themselves. They sought the entire list of death-causing poison agents.

Father Kenneth B. Murphy of Boston, the Roman Catholic priest who heads the group, said that more than 1,000 others have also been saved from suicide.

Since 1933, he noted, hardly anyone in Boston has been a suicide victim in this country.

Contact: "We cannot fix an exact number of those we have succeeded in persuading against self-homicide," he said, "but out of the 1,200 cases we are reasonably sure that without our intervention a very considerable percentage would have taken their lives."

ACCORDING TO Father Murphy, 24 persons were saved after attempting to drown themselves in the Charles River. "In almost every instance," he said, "it was found the victims had served due warning of their designs on their own lives—days, weeks and sometimes months before."

Father Murphy said that nearing the close of the organization's first year, 99 teenagers seriously considered taking their lives. Forty-one of them were girls.

"Our case log includes patients from all social strata and every financial background," he added. "A large percentage of potential suicides came to our attention through contacts made by the would-be self-killers."

## Protestants List Film On Solomon 'Outrageous'

Berlin — (RNS) — The American movie, "Solomon and Sheba," was criticized by a Protestant publication as an "outrageous" offense to Christian believers.

Sonntagsblatt, official organ of the Evangelical Church of Berlin and Brandenburg, charged that "the traditional violation of the Old Testament by Hollywood film producers is continued with this \$6,000,000 Bible circus to an unprecedented tastelessness."

"As King Solomon," the paper's critic wrote, "Yul Brynner does not show his profitable bald head, but wears a wig and the crown of David, while Gina Lollobrigida, as the Queen of Sheba, is satisfied with 18 dresses by the Italian fashion designer, Emilio Schuberth, but at times even with a few silver threads or a golden bathtub."
