Mission Appeals Set In Diocese

Bishop Kearney has given permission to twenty-eight mission societies to appeal in this diocese for their particular mission needs according to Rev. George Wood, Diocesan Director of the Propagation of the Faith. This is in accordance with the Missionary Conference Plan in existence in the diocese for the past 2 years.

Each parish has one particular appeal in addition to the general world-wide mission appeal sponsored by the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

TWO HUNDRED thirty-five applications were received in the Propagation of the Faith Office this year for participation in the Annual Canisius College Debate

The mission cause and the urgency of its needs are presented to the people of the parishes by men who speak from personal experience and a year which prompted them to dedicate their lives to missionary work.

Last year the sum of \$76,019.53 was collected in the Diocese for the mission cooperatives in the Plan.

FUNDS ARE sent to missionary bishops in South Africa, China, British Columbia, Ecuador, Finland, Pakistan,

Annual HN Bowling Tournament Slated

The Silver Anniversary Holy Name five-man handicap annual bowling tournament will be rolled for 16 consecutive days, Saturday, April 23 through Sunday, May 8, at the North Park Lanes, 711 Ridge Road, East (corner Hudson Ave.) on route 104, Rochester.

The tournament, sanctioned by the American Bowling Congress and under the auspices of the Catholic Men's Bowling Association, is expected to attract 1,600 teams from New York, State, and northern Pennsylvania.

Officers of the Catholic Men's Bowling Association are Kenneth Butler, president; Joseph Gainer, and Gerald Jucker, vice-president; John McDermott, treasurer, and Fred Enders, secretary and tournament manager. The spiritual director of the group is the Rev. Francis J. Pagan.

THE TOURNAMENT fee is \$20 per team, of which \$10.75 will be used for prizes. Prizes will be returned 100% in plazza. All Catholics who are members of the American Bowling Congress may participate. The highest average in any league last year will be used with the scratch average being 220 pins. Handicap is based on 70% of the difference between the team average and that figure. Prize ratio will be at least three prizes for each ten entries.

No team over the 950 average may enter. Entrants may bowl only once. Entrants will be accepted until midnight, Thursday, March 31. All reserve entries are due by March 26. Drawings for alleys will be held the night entrants bowl. Teams or individuals presently bowling in unsanctioned leagues are not eligible to bowl in this tournament.




