Funds For Mothers Urged

Vermont - (RNS) - National legislation to provide a monthly allowance of 500 scribbles (50¢) for all mothers of growing children in Austria was urged by the General Assembly of the Vienna Catholic Family Association at its annual Congress Day Conference here.

The assembly adopted a resolution which declared that the state should provide financial aid to mothers so they "will not be forced to seek employment outside the home."

The time has come for direct action in this matter which has been repeatedly discussed by Catholic groups and never acted upon," said the association's president, Dr. Bruno Schimetschek.

Bishop Bruno Wechner, Vicar General of the Apostolic Administration of Innsbruck, Feldkirch, Austria, who is the group's spiritual advisor, also stressed the need for "keeping the mother inside the home."

Bishop Wechner said that many modern women are forced to divide their time in many directions - as housewife, mother, or worker in a trade or profession. "The result," he said, "is detrimental to the welfare of the family, and ultimately to society itself."

A testimonial dinner attended by more than 700 guests honored the Rev. Francis E. Lucey, S.J., regent of the Georgetown University Law School since 1931, who has just celebrated his Golden Jubilee as a Roman Catholic priest.

Justice William J. Brennan, Jr., Justice Tom C. Clark, and retired Judge Stanley T. Reed headed the list of jurists who came to pay tribute to the modest priest who half a century ago was torn between law and the priesthood as a vocation and the priesthood as a vocation.

Washington - (RNS) - The Mariological Society of America announced at the close of its 11th annual convention here that it would petition the Eccumenical Council summoned by Pope John XXIII to inaugurate further study of the Blessed Virgin's role as Co-Redemptrix.

Catholic theologians hold that the doctrine of the co-redemption of the Blessed Virgin in the Redemption is implicit in the teaching of the early ecclesiastical writers and was developed more explicitly by writers from the 9th to the 16th century. In the present century, many of the writings of Pope Pius XII and Pope Pius XII have been cited in favor of Mary's formal co-operation in the redemptive work of Christ.

Cuba Bishop Asks More Vocations

Santiago - (NC) - Archbishop Enrique Perez Serantes of Santiago de Cuba has issued a pastoral letter calling for more religious vocations, religious instruction and lay apostolate work among the labor classes.

Archbishop Perez Serantes also paid note to the "complete and extraordinary affirmation of the Catholic Faith" given by the people of Cuba during last November's Catholic Congress in Havana.

The Archbishop's pastoral letter said it is necessary to strive for vocations, priestly ones in particular. He said the present 40 seminarians are less than one fifth of those needed to care for the two million faithful in the archdiocese.

As to religious instruction, he said 6,000 more nuns, teachers or catechists are needed to reach 400,000 children of school age.

However, he added, he had just returned from a tour of the United States where he found people in many places "who did not know what the World Refugee Year was, or whose knowledge was very hazy."

One of the main concerns in connection with the Refugee Year, he said, was that people would think that the refugee problem would be over when the Year finished. He added, "It is that we can do twice as much as in an average year of indifference."
