

Vows Of Jesuit Brother Taken By Thomas Casey

Brother Thomas J. Casey, S.J., became the 71 Rochesterian to take vows as a Jesuit Brother at Profession ceremonies on Saturday, March 12 at St. Andrew's Church, Poughkeepsit, N.Y.

Son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Casey of St. Ambrose Parish, Brother Casey has two sisters—Sister M. Ambrosine, S.J., of St. Joseph Convent, Wayland, and Sister Helen Casey, Bobrich Drive, Rochester.

A VETERAN OF World War I, Brother Casey attended St. Ambrose School, Aquinas Institute, Rochester Institute of Technology and the School of Modern Photography, New York.

He was a well-known local photographer when he entered the Jesuit order in September, 1937. He freelanced for the Catholic Courier-Journal.

Jesuit Brothers are usually devoted to the assistance of the priests of the Society of Jesus in temporal affairs. Some Brothers work as librarians, cooks or bookkeepers. Others are artists, technicians, pharmacists, engineers, etc.

Though the Jesuit Brothers are not put through the full course of formal studies which is part of the life of the Jesuit Priests, they are trained in those fields which will make them efficient in their particular assignments.

Brother Casey is a member of the Society of Jesus whose province is the New York Province of the Society of Jesus.

The two seventeenth century saints—French founders of the Daughters of Charity are being honored in special programs in every house staffed by their spiritual descendants in the country throughout the 1960 Tercentenary Year.

MISTRESS TERESA, Hospital Administrator, opened the program with a discussion of St. Vincent de Paul, Founder of the Daughters of Charity.
