ancient devout practice of his faith.

Bishop Kearney will offer the funeral Mass at Sacred Heart Cathedral this morning.

Attending the Mass will be citizens of all ranks and creeds to pay tribute to the newlyweds' executive.

J. G. HICKEY, as a twelve year old lad, peddled news papers to help his widowed mother support her family. He later became a clothing store bookkeeper at \$10 a week to put him on the path that ended at the summit of his trade.

He joined forces with George A. Brayer and Jacob L. Freedman in 1899 to found the now internationally famous firm.

His interest in industrial peace prompted his signing a pioneering union contract with the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America with Sidney Hillman in 1919.

He served his city and his nation in multiple ways over the years — as a member of the Rochester Park Board and the board of the Bureau of Municipal Research (which he helped found in 1915). He was War Price Commissioner for the Rochester area under the War Act in the early 1920's and played a prominent role in the 1933 National Recovery Administration of President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Mr. Hickey was a close friend of George Eastman and like Mr. Eastman, a staunch promoter of the city of Rochester. He was long active in the city's Chamber of Commerce and was its president in 1920.

He also belonged to several local clubs, including the Knights of Columbus of which he was an honorary life member of the organization.

His wife was Consuline J. Duffy who died four years ago. He is survived by four sons: Walter B. D. Hickey, Thomas T. G. Hickey, Jeremiah G. Hickey (all carrying on the family tradition at the Hickey-Fraeman firm) and Edward J. Hickey, a Rochester attorney; and two daughters: Margaret (Mrs. John C.) Menihan and Teresa (Mrs. Jenkins E.) Doyle, and 24 grandchildren and many nieces and nephews.

Burial will be at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

V — MATRIMONY

When our Saviour Jesus Christ built His bridge of seven sacraments to bring souls to heaven, He wisely provided a special sacrament for married people.

The "V" will appear to every young couple at Catholic parishes, launching them on an adventure about which nothing is really known except that it is steeped with difficulties.

Their commitment links them "until death" to an intimate sharing of life's joys and sorrows.

Does it not require courage and confidence for every young couple, who are not even know each other, to step hand in hand across the threshold of so enduring a life as this?

Aged couples who can look back over the long road they have traveled together easily to the help God gave them to succeed in their magnificent marriage adventure.

GOD'S PLAN for marriage is older than sin. He saw it recorded in the Bible's Book of Genesis. "It is not good for man to be alone." Ever since Adam, every day some young man somewhere again realizes "It is not good to be alone" where he discovers the girl he wants to be his wife.
