M. DelVecchio Awarded By Catholic Veterans

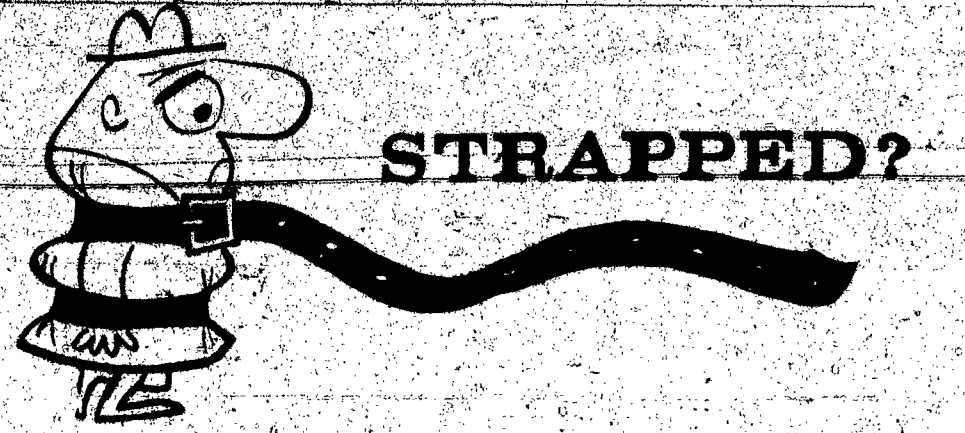

 The paper was rated high for layout, editing and photography.



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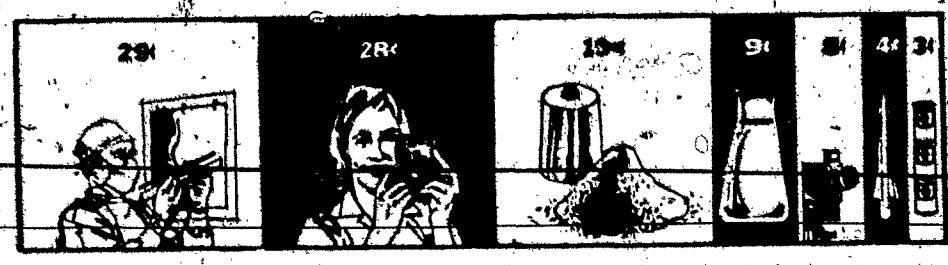
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KODAK REPORTS

to the community on 1959 business highlights and the outlook for 1960

Progress was made in nearly all major aspects of Kodak business in 1959 and financial results were the best to date.
Sales increase. In 1959, consolidated sales of Kodak's U.S. establishments were \$914.1 million, up 10 percent over 1958.
Earnings up. Net earnings of \$124.7 million were 26 percent higher than the \$98.9 million for 1958.
Dividends higher. Cash dividends declared on common shares were \$1.80 per share, up 26 percent over the \$1.42½ in 1958.
\$60 million for improvements. This amount was invested for additions, improvements, and replacements in Kodak's U.S. plants and offices during 1959. About \$28.7 million of the total was spent for these purposes in the company's Rochester units. The 1960 budget for such purposes is \$67 million, including about \$32 million for Rochester-Kodak units.
Business outside U.S. also grows. Kodak's associate companies in other countries also had a good year. Expressed in terms of U.S. dollars, their sales were \$262.5 million, up nine percent over 1958.
World sales exceed \$3 billion. Since 1948, when figures have been reported on a U.S. consolidated basis. It is interesting to note, however, that the company's sales on a world-consolidated basis were \$1.1 billion in 1956, up about 10 percent over the 1958 total.
Outlook promising. Assuming there is no major downward change in the level of general business in 1960, Kodak's business should continue to grow as a result of the introduction of new products and increased use of goods and services already available. Earnings should compare favorably with those of 1959.



Source of Kodak's 1959 sales dollar by major product groups: Commercial and professional products—29%; Amateur photographic products—33%; Fibers and plastics—19%; Chemicals—4%; Professional motion picture film—2%; Special military work—4%; Miscellaneous—3%.

Man-made fibers, plastics, and industrial chemicals produced by the Tennessee Eastman Company division at Kingsport, and by the Texas Eastman Company at Longview, had sizeable sales increases. Use of the new Kodak polyester fiber in men's and women's clothing increased. The Distillation Products Industries division in Rochester had a good year. Among DPI products are vitamins concentrated for the pharmaceutical, food, and animal feed industries.

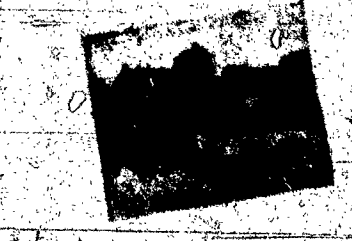


Kodak research and development brought many advances which contributed to the progress of the business in 1959 and gave promise of new and improved products for 1960 and the years ahead.

At Kodak Park, new equipment and facilities contributed to increased production. Total sales of photographic film, paper, and chemicals made at Kodak Park showed a good advance over 1958. This gain reflected higher demand for many black-and-white photo materials, color photographic films and papers, and other products.



At the Apparatus and Optical Division in Rochester, special tools and equipment have been installed to produce equipment meters for new "electric-eye" cameras. Total sales of photo equipment were the best to date, chiefly because of strong demand for the new automatic still and movie cameras, self-developing 35mm projectors, and other new products. The Star line of still cameras also did particularly well.
