## \$150,000 Drive Launched In Corning

Corning—The general solicitation for \$150,000 to build a new parochial grade school in St. Patrick's Parish started last Saturday night when nearly 300 men of the church heard Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey address them on the need for further educational facilities in the diocese.

Bishop Casey was keynote speaker at the campaign kickoff dinner in the Barco Steubens Hotel, with Karl L. Gatzert, drive chairman, serving as toastmaster.

Sunday afternoon the 300 men began contacting the individual homes of St. Patrick's parishioners. Miller is the week, at another meeting, it was reported that more than 50 per cent of the special gifts donors had been contacted to get the drive off to a flying start. J. Edward Barry heads this committee.

"THE OUTLOOK for the success of this campaign is good," Bishop Casey said, "because our Catholic people always come through when the need is there."

He suggested that St. Patrick's Parish needs a new school and added that members of the parish have found the training of their children by nuns to be of a high order.

During the final speaking program, it was announced that the campaign program is St. Patrick's Parish Fund for Educational Facilities.

Lo Devany of Foley Associates, Rochester, who is directing the drive, instructed the general solicitation workers and district of Rochester, secretary is Benedict Campbell his.

THE FINANCE plan for the new 8-classroom school at Division Pkwy. and Steuben St. will run for a period of 186 weeks, providing four tax years in which pledges may be paid in developer's installments on a weekly, monthly or quarterly basis. Each taxpayer in the parish is asked to give one day's pay each month during the three year period.

The school will have a classroom area of more than 11,000 square feet. Plans call for a parish hall, with kitchen space and more than 3,500 square feet for meetings and dinners.

At the kickoff dinner, several clergymen in attendance were introduced, including the Rt. Rev. Magr. Edward J. McAniff.

## Convention Lists Aquinas Librarian

The Rev. John E. Whitley, O.S.B., librarian of Aquinas Institute, will preside at the High School Section meetings of the Catholic Library Association when it holds its annual conference in New York April 12-13, 1960.

Father Whitley assumed office as Chairman of the High School Section of CLA at the end of its annual Conference last Easter, and he has prepared the program for the coming meeting.

THE THEME of the program is the "Catholic Library and the Social Order." Among the speakers will be the Rev. James Keller, M.M., Director of the Christian movement, who will talk on the responsibility of the school library in preparing the young man for the social order.

Miss Margaret C. Scoggin, Coordinator of Young Adult Services in the New York Public Library, has achieved national fame for her work among young people. Her topic will be "Breaking the Reading Barrier."

Miss Mary Helen Maher, Specialist for School and Children's Libraries, in the national office of Education, will discuss the standards for school libraries.

"PAPERBACKS in the School Library" will be discussed by Edward A. Walsh of the Journalism Department of Fordham University; and Mrs. Sheila O'Shahy of Ferris, Stuyvesant and Goddard, Inc., will discuss "More books for More Students."

Eugene P. Walingford, editor of "The Catholic Periodical Index" will preside at a session devoted to the problems of providing books for the Foreign Mission. He will be assisted by
