Fire Victims' Rites Conducted in Auburn

Auburn—The explosion which rocked downtown Auburn on March 30 took the lives of three Catholic firemen, Lt. Alfred H. Murphy, and Firemen John F. Seaving and Anthony T. Contrera.

Also killed were Walter Ockenfels, 64, who operated the station for the R. J. Connor Oil Co., and John Bell, 30, a Conner employee. Fireman Sidney Burdick was the only one of a four-man fire detail to survive the explosion.

FUNERAL SERVICES for the three Catholic firemen which were held at successive hours during Saturday morning were attended by city, county and state officials led by Mayor Maurice I. Schwartz and Fire Chief Luke Berman. Many members of the clergy were present in the sanctuaries.

Lieutenant Murphy, 31, who was a veteran of 22 years in the department is survived by his widow, Irene Brunner Murphy, a daughter, Jeanne, 10, son, Edward, a senior at Mt. Carmel High School, and Mary Ann in the 8th grade at St. Alphonsus School, also two brothers, Charles, Auburn, William, New York City, four sisters, Mrs. Lawrence Ryder, Skaneateles; Mrs. Adelaide Cullen; Miss Ellen Murphy, Miss Rita Murphy, Auburn.

A solemn Mass of Requiem was offered at St. Alphonsus Church by Rev. Francis C. Waterstraat, pastor, with Rev. Robert Kreckel as deacon and Rev. Gerald Connor, as sub-deacon.

John F. Seaving, 27, husband of Elizabeth Smith Seaving, is survived by his widow, one daughter, Cindy Marie, age two, son, Richard John, seven months; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Francis L. Seaving, Auburn, two sisters, Mrs. Ann Seaving, Auburn, Mrs. Raymond Bennett, Baltimore, Md. Fireman Seaving was a veteran of the Korean War where he served in the Navy.

THE FUNERAL corteges passed briefly in front of Memorial City Hall while the bell tolled in respect to the deceased firemen and armed service veterans. All three men were buried in St. Joseph's Cemetery.

3 Year Grant Offered By Geneva Nurses

Geneva—Geneva Chapter of Catholic Nurses will offer a full three-year nursing scholarship again this year. Known as the Bishop Kearney Scholarship, it is available to any high school graduate in the area from which Geneva Chapter draws its members. THE CHAPTER area covers Geneva, Waterloo, New York, Ovid, Seneca Falls and Clifton Springs school districts. To be successful candidate, a complete three-year scholarship is granted to one of the Diocese's three schools of nursing: St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira; St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell; or St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester.

Any girl interested should file a regular application at the school of her choice and take the qualifying examination, mentioning that she is a candidate for the Bishop Kearney Scholarship. She should also write a personal letter of application to the chairman of the scholarship committee, Mrs. Louise Shiffen, 91 Lafayette Ave. ANY HIGH school graduate, not necessarily a member of the present graduating class, can make application. Religious affiliations will not be considered as part of the qualifications.

The scholarship committee will meet the first week in May to award the scholarship. All candidates will be notified promptly concerning the results of this meeting. The award will be made on the basis of financial need, scholastic ratings, personal letters of the applicants, and the recommendations of the director of the schools of nursing.
