Closeup Of Mass To Be Seen On TV

Shutouts of the Rochester area who tune Channel 5 this Sunday morning from 9:45 to 11 o'clock will have a better view of their Easter Sunday Mass than those thousands who will crowd diocesan churches.

That's the promise of WROC-TV technicians whose cameras will cover every ceremony of the High Mass to be offered Easter morning for the sick and shutouts of the Diocese from the new chapel of the Nazareth Academy Convent.

A CLOSEUP camera position at the Epistle corner of the altar will provide excellent side view of many details of the priest's actions usually hidden from the congregation.

A second camera on a rolling platform just outside the Communion rail will permit wide angle views of the full sanctuary, the preacher, the congregation, the reception of Holy Communion and the procession to and from the altar.

THE EASTER DAY telecast will include a sermon by Rev. Charles B. Connell, chaplain of Nazareth Academy, music by the Sisters' Choir directed by Sister Rose Theresa of the Academy faculty and descriptive commentary on the ceremonies by the Rev. Henry A. Atwell, editor of the Courier Journal.

Rev. Richard Torney, chaplain of Our Lady of Mercy High School, will be the celebrant of the Mass.

Offered specifically for those who cannot get out to church for Easter or Christmas, the three-year telecast of Catholic Mass has become the outstanding religious program of the WROC schedule.

The Easter program is the seventeenth local Mass the Diocese has televised for the Diocese as a special service.

As a special visual instruction before the Mass begins, Father Torney and Father Atwell will briefly describe the main features of the Easter Vigil ceremony which all parish churches will have Holy Saturday evening, the night before Easter. A demonstration of the lighting of the "new fire" preparation of the Paschal Candle, blessing of holy water and the renewal of the Baptismal vows will be telecast. Atwell's introduction to the ritual of the Easter Mass.

This new concept for the Nazareth Academy faculty was formally opened only four months ago. It replaced a cluster of several houses in which the Sisters of St. Joseph had

lived on Lake View Park next to the high school for 44 years.

The chapel, under a beamed, peaked roof, is brightened with exquisite stained glass windows and features a large painting of the Holy Family over a simple, low altar.

Nazareth Academy alumnae and friends who contributed to the Sisters' building fund campaign can "visit" the chapel by television this Sunday to see the beauty and reverence they helped provide for their faculty.

Sister Agnes Cecelia, principal of the Academy which has an enrollment of 1,414 girls, is also superior of the Convent where 66 Sisters live.

Easter Mass, Ceremonies Mark Resurrection Feast

Easter Sunday morning High Mass will celebrate Solemn Pontifical Mass in Sacred Heart Cathedral at 11 a.m.

This Solemn Pontifical Mass will bring to a climax the solemn observance of Lent and Holy Week in the Diocese of Rochester. St. Bernard's Seminary Choir will provide the music.

ALL CHURCHES of the Diocese will hold impressive Easter Vigil rites Holy Saturday evening.

Most have scheduled the Vigil ceremonies to begin about 11 p.m. to conclude with midnight Mass.

Some churches, including Sacred Heart Cathedral, will hold the Vigil rites earlier Saturday evening. The Cathedral ceremony will begin at 7:30 p.m. with Mass at 8:45 p.m.

Striking feature of the Easter Vigil will be renewal of baptismal vows by congregations in candle-light churches.

Holy Saturday ceremonies, previous to 1956 were observed in most churches on Saturday morning. Holy Saturday rites are now held in the evening.

Congregations will be urged to sing the responses and other chants of the Vigil service and Mass in accord with recent directions.

THE HOUR LONG rites preceding the Vigil Mass will include blessing of the new fire and Easter candle, symbols of Christ rising from the dead. Water will be blessed for use at baptism and the litany of the saints will be chanted.

All ceremonies are to be conducted in such a way that the people will see and understand them.

Many pastors have arranged to have a priest in the pulpit to explain the rites while other priests conduct the ceremony in the sanctuary.

There will be no church services on Holy Saturday morning.

CONFESSIONS will be heard Saturday afternoon and evening in preparation for Easter Communion.

Catholics desiring to receive Holy Communion at the Easter Vigil Mass are required to ob-

serve the usual fast three hours, others shutting down from noon from solids and one hour from liquids.

Corning — In a financial report made public last week, the St. Patrick's School building fund appeal passed the \$150,000 goal by \$35,000, and construction of the new school building is expected to begin early in July.

Students are expected to start using the new school in the fall of 1961.

The last report showed that pledges stood at \$184,190.10, according to Leo DeVany, representative of Foley Associates of Rochester, fund raising advisory firm, who has had charge of the administrative work on the drive. He says that more cleanup work still remains to be done.

The Rev. William Tobin, administrator of St. Patrick's, praised the "unfailing loyalty" of the parishioners who responded to the appeal.
