Aaken are old used sheets and men's shirts to make up bandages and shirts to be altered into hospital gowns.

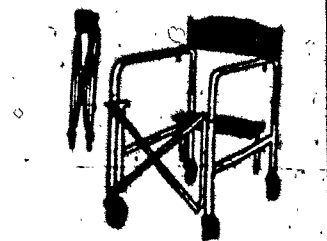

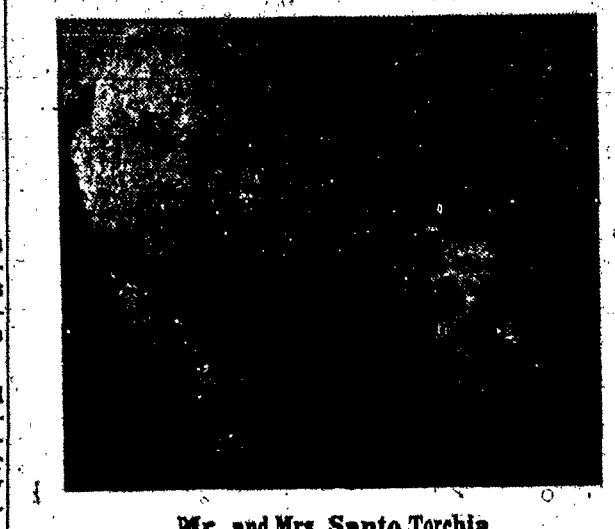
