FATHER ENGLE will return to his native Dansville to sing his First Solemn Mass at 12 noon, Sunday, May 1. He will be assisted by the pastor, Rev. John Merklinger, archpriest; Rev. Simon P. Wood, C.P., professor, Holy Cross Seminary, Dunkirk, deacon, and Rev. Orin W. Feller, assistant pastor, Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Rochester, subdeacon. Very Rev. Gerald A. Orlando, C.P., rector, St. Mary's Monastery, Dunkirk, will preach. A reception will be held from 4 to 6 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 170 Main Street, Dansville.

Born Sept. 13, 1932, Father Engle attended St. Mary School and Central High School, Dansville, and Niagara University, Niagara Falls.
