**Ithaca KC Class To
Honor Msgr. Cleary**

Ithaca—The Very Rev. Msgr. Donald M. Cleary, newly appointed pastor of the new Ithaca parish, St. Catherine of Siena, will have the Knights of Columbus Third Degree class to be exemplified in Ithaca on Sunday, May 29, named in his honor according to Grand Knight John K. Barrett.

This major degree, the first to be held by the Ithaca Council 277 in ten years, will be conducted by the team from Westchester County and will be held in the hall of the Veterans of Foreign Wars on West State Street.

It is expected that candidates will be present from several of the surrounding Councils and will begin at 2 p.m. with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament at the Church of the Immaculate Conception.

ALL INVITED Grand Knights have been asked to have their candidates at the Parish Hall before 1 p.m. for processing by Financial Secretary George Klesman and his committee.

The festivities of the day will conclude with a buffet dinner at the Knights of Columbus clubrooms at 114 South Albany St.

Barrett also announced due to the size of the class of candidates for the Second Degree that this exemplification will be held at the Immaculate Conception Parish Hall at 8 p.m. on Thursday, May 5. All candidates for the Third Degree are requested to be at this meeting.

400 Attend NAS Mass

About 400 members and guests attended the annual Mass and corporate Communion of the Nocturnal Adoration Society of the Elmira Area Sunday morning, April 24, at Saint Casimir's Church.

George W. Cavanaugh of Syracuse, secretary of the Society's Syracuse unit and president of the Legion of Mary at Saint John the Baptist Church in Syracuse, addressed the group at its annual Holy Communion breakfast in the parish hall after Mass.

Sunday afternoon, 74 new members were received into the society in ceremonies at Saint Peter and Paul's Church. This program was under the direction of William J. O'Bryan, chairman of the reception committee.

IN HIS TALK at the breakfast, Cavanaugh reviewed the role of the Nocturnal Adoration Society in the revival of the laymen's importance in church affairs in the early 19th century.

The organization was founded at Rome in 1812 and spread through the continent, becoming particularly strong in France due to the great work of a Jewish convert.

It was firmly established in the United States through the work of the Blessed Sacrament Fathers in 1903. There are now 47 centers in the United States with about 90,000 members.

The local Nocturnal Adoration Society, which is composed of men and high school boys from the Elmira Area, meets once each month at Saint Peter and Paul's Church, and, throughout the night, keeps watch before the Blessed Sacrament in a series of nine Holy Hours.

BREAKFAST arrangements were made by co-chairmen Robert Erway and Arthur Kieffer and ticket chairman Joseph Corbo. Lawrence Hastings was toastmaster; Francis T. Steed, president of the society, greeted the group.

At the breakfast, a spiritual bouquet was presented to Rev. Bartholomew J. O'Brien, spiritual director. The Rev. Leonard P. Kujawski of Saint Casimir's Church, who will travel to Munich, Germany, this summer for the International Eucharistic Congress, was appointed the society's representative to the Congress.

The Saint Casimir's Rotary and Sacred Heart Society served the breakfast under the direction of Mrs. Stanley A. Melos.

Plans Announced For New School

Seneca Falls — Complete plans for the new St. Patrick's Parochial School were announced by Rev. John P. O'Brien, pastor. The cost of the building project is in excess of \$300,000 with the Building Fund Campaign goal of \$180,000.

More than 65 men of the parish will be working on the campaign. Advance City Solicitations will be on Sunday, May 15, and General Solicitation on Sunday, May 22.

Details of the building construction are as follows: The proposed new school for St. Patrick's Church is to be located east of the existing school on Bayard Street, and between the auditorium and the sidewalk.

THE SPECIAL BUILDING will be approached from Bayard Street. As a visitor approaches the building, he will particularly note the simple construction which consolidates and connects the existing auditorium and school structures.

THE CONSTRUCTION of the building will be economical and durable. Parallels will be exposed concrete block, except where the exterior walls run into the entrance of the side of the building, which will be brick. Corridors will be exposed painted concrete block, which may later have ceramic tile to these surfaces for easier maintenance.

Floor throughout the building will be durable and easily maintained. Entrance foyers where the children will take off their rubbers and outdoor clothes will be finished with a hard quarry tile, and the stairways will be finished with present approved materials. Classrooms will have carpet tile floors.

Carroll lockers will be provided for the classrooms on the second floor, and the classrooms in the first floor will be equipped with washbasins in the hallway tile floors.
