400 Attend NAS Mass

About 400 members and the United States through the society attended the annual Mass work of the Blessed Sacrament and corporate Communion of Fathers in 1960. There are now 47 centers in the United States with about 90,000 members.

The local Nocturnal Adoration Society, which is composed of men and high school boys from the Elmira Area, meets once each month at Saint Peter and Paul's Church, and throughout the night, keep watch before the Blessed Sacrament in a series of nine Holy Hours.

In his talk at the breakfast, Cavanaugh reviewed the role of the Nocturnal Adoration Society in the revival of the laymen's importance in church affairs in the early 19th century.

The organization was founded at Rome in 1812 and spread through the continent, becoming particularly strong in France due to the great work of a Jewish convert.
