

School Campaign Hits \$202,000

Corning—The St. Patrick's school fund campaign has hit the \$202,000 mark, it was announced during Mass at the church last Sunday morning.

The goal of \$150,000 was originally passed during the two-week drive a month ago. Since then, an additional \$15,000 in pledges has been received.

Construction on the new \$250,000 parochial school is expected to start this summer with occupancy slated for the fall of 1961.

Canvassing began early in April and was completed in about a week. At the formal conclusion of the drive, pledges were at \$184,000.

Total cost of the school will be \$250,000. The school will be a one-story structure on property recently acquired east of the present parochial school on Denison Pkwy. East.

THE SCHOOL will house 400 pupils. The present school has 300 students.

The existing school building will be converted into a church hall with a large auditorium and other rooms to be used for parish activities.

In January, 1946, the old "Salvation Army barracks" was purchased for St. Patrick's Chapel.

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Ukrainians Ask Saint Title For Red Victim

Detroit—(NC)—More than 4,000 Ukrainian Catholics gathered in the Ford Auditorium here to appeal for beatification for Archbishop Andrew Sheptytsky of Lvov.

CALLED THE "apostle of church unity," Archbishop Sheptytsky devoted much of his life to reuniting Catholics and Orthodox Christians. He traveled over much of the world in this cause.

The prelate died at Lvov, now part of the Soviet Union, in November, 1944, at the age of 78. During his lifetime he was a victim of both Nazi and Soviet persecution. He won a reputation in World War II as a special friend and protector of Jews, many of whom he kept from imprisonment or death.
