

### Seduction Film Rated Class C

New York — (NC)—The National Legion of Decency has condemned the movie "Private Property," calling it "unmitigated concentration" upon a seduction theme.

In placing the film on its class C (condemned) list, the legion stated that the film is "morally dangerous to any type of audience." The legion also noted that the movie, distributed by Citizen Films, lacks the gold seal of approval of the organized American motion picture industry.

### Faith Gains in Ghana

Vatican City — (RNS)—Roman Catholic membership in Ghana has jumped more than 90 per cent in the last decade, according to the latest statistics released here on the West African Republic.

Fides, official news agency of the Sacred Congregation for Propagating the Faith, reported Catholics in Ghana at \$8,712, a 92 per cent increase over the 252,500 reported ten years ago. The Republic's overall population is 4,800,000.

### \$356 Million Total Church Fires Set New Peak

Boston — (RNS) — Church losses from major fires took a sharp rise in the United States and Canada during the past year, with more than \$3,000,000 worth of church property destroyed in 10 large-loss fires.

The 1968 figures were contained in a report released here by the National Fire Protection Association. They compared

with the previous year's record of only four major fires causing damage totaling nearly \$1,170,000.

THE ANALYSIS, compiled annually by the fire safety organization, includes only large-loss fires — those with individual losses of \$250,000 or more. Other estimates indicated that fires of all sizes cost churches an average of about \$15,000,000 annually. A detailed analysis of church losses in all types of fires is issued annually by the Association in the fall.

Six of the major church fires in 1968 occurred in the United States. The largest single loss was the \$200,000 destruction of St. Mary's Catholic church in Westphalia, Mich., on April 20. Of the four Canadian fires, the largest was the \$200,000 loss at St. Anne's Catholic church in Mattawa, Ont., Sept. 8.

Church-operated schools also were involved in large-loss fires the past year, according to the NFPA report.

Two Catholic parochial schools at Mattawa, Ont., and Burn Lake, British Columbia, were destroyed at a cost of more than \$625,000. There were fire losses totaling \$575,000 at two private Catholic schools in Tewksbury, Mass., and Cornwall, Conn.

The NFPA described its analysis of large-loss fires as a record of the "major protection failures of the year." Elimination of such losses can be accomplished, it said, through proper design of buildings and through use of protection equipment such as automatic sprinklers and alarm systems.

Cost of all large-loss fires in the United States and Canada during 1968 was more than \$3,000,000, of which the United States share was nearly \$2,100,000. The total was the highest in history. Of the 610 major fires recorded, 73 involved the loss of \$1,000,000 or more in a single fire.
