Looking Back

Editor's Time-Machine Sees Alhambra's Past

The time-machine which was used to send Tennessee Ernie back to Camelot and King Arthur's Round Table in oblivion, the other night, would come in handy for this film back on the Order of the Alhambra.

As one of the scientists said in the TV production: "Rein-

gion is our most important product."

The use of the time-machine is brought about by members of Musa Caravan, No. 23, deciding to erect a shrine of the Blessed Virgin Mary on St. Mary's Hospital grounds, to be dedicated by Bishop Kearney, Sunday, May 12 at 5 p.m.

TIME ORDER of the Alhambra was founded as a fun-loving group of third degree members of the Knights of Columbus who pause along the way in market sites of Catholic historical interest. The local Caravan was founded in 1911 and it is to that year and succeeding years that the time machine is called upon to bring back to the screen.

This writer picked up the image of the early 1920s when Edward J. Walsh, the printer-and-artist was given command. He signed his membership scroll and a few years later the Caravan's publicity problems were assigned to him. For many years thereafter, after joining the Catholic press the article of the Alhambra were written for the Catholic paper, the Miller and other weeklies and the national Alhambra paper.

When Daniel F. Fitzgerald, attorney, became grand commander, the time machine showed a publication for the local Caravan was started. A small four-page news sheet on yellow paper appears with the date Nov. 1, 1923 and Vol. 1, No. 1, was called "Nissa Muus" at the suggestion of Vincent Ganni, who voluntarily solicited the advertisement. The writer was editor, the newsletter shows. The issue carried messages from Maurice F. Sammons, general secretary of the K. of C. and a column by Grand Commander Fitzgerald.

AMONG OTHER items the commander's column reads: "Life should be pleasure and made more cheerful. Long faces should be out of style permanently."

The Caravan's meetings were held in the Cot building, the Rochester Ad Club quarters in Hotel Rochester, later the Sagamore hotel, affectionately dubbed Harry Bonner's "East Avenue meeting house" by Grand Commander John A. Doyle. Later at many places.

Millions Are Hungry

Pope Backs UN Food Aid Plan

Vatican City—(NC)—Pope John XXIII told officials of the United Nations Food and Agricultural Organization that all men must help feed the world's underfed peoples.

He spoke at an audience granted to delegates to the 10th international conference of the FAO's Campaign against Hunger. They included FAO Director B. X. See.

Noting that a purpose of the FAO campaign is to attract worldwide attention to the problem of hunger, Pope John declared: "Millions of human beings suffer hunger for the world. Others while not actually hungry, do not have means to consume sufficient quantities of the food they need."

THE POPE said the plight of these people "must be presented from the houses."

"The world does not at present produce enough food to satisfy the needs of all men, especially in view of the favorable increase of population in the next future."

"Conscience must be aroused to a sense of responsibility that weighs on each and every one, especially on the more privileged," he stated. "Today we are in a world where distances no longer count and make the excuse that the needs of distant brothers are not known to him, and that he is not concerned with helping them, all of us are wholly responsible for the underprivileged people."

The Pope concluded: "We find great joy in the thought of the immense possibilities of this campaign which will have, we are certain, the support of all men of heart and of all intelligent people, whether private or public, truly concerned with the welfare of mankind."
