Shrine Dedication Set For Sunday

The construction of the Shrine in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary, sponsored by the Alhambra, Order of the Alhambra, is completed and dedication will take place Sunday, May 22 at 5 p.m. on the grounds of St. Mary's Hospital.

BISHOP KEARNEY will participate in the celebration and will bless the shrine. The Nurses' Choir of St. Mary's Hospital will provide the ceremonial music.

Knights of Columbus Fourth Degree Honor Guard will act as escort for the Bishop.

The Alhambra erected the shrine to commemorate the location of the first Catholic Hospital in Western New York and to give recognition to the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul for their work in this community.

IT WILL also serve as a remembrance to Past Supreme Commander, the late Norman A. O'Brien for the work done for St. Mary's and the Order of Alhambra.

Originally St. Mary's Hospital was on the spot where this Shrine now stands. The old building has since been replaced by a new and modern one. At this location in the year 1857 the old hospital was founded. During the Civil War period, the hospital served the needs of all soldiers and the people of the community.

THE SISTERS of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul have been responsible for its operation since it was built. The Order of the Daughters of Charity was founded in France in the year of 1633 by St. Vincent de Paul and Louise de Marillac. At present the Order comprises 4,800 members who carry on their good work in 64 countries all over the world.

September 27, 1960 will mark the 300th anniversary of the death of St. Vincent de Paul, the Founder of the Congregation of the Mission.

The late Norman A. O'Brien was active on the Board of the hospital in various administrative capacities.

THE ALHAMBRA is composed of Knights of Columbus in good standing. Its aim is to exemplify and commemorate Catholic historical places of interest. The shrine at St. Mary's is an example of its work and is probably its greatest achievement to date.

The shrine is about eighteen feet high. The statue is of Carrara marble and stands on a pedestal with a background of blue mosaic tile, flanked by flower urns.

The shrine at this location will be viewed by thousands daily. In turn it will serve as a reminder for prayers for peace among nations.

Mrs. Caravan, through Grand Commander Leo H. O'Mara and Co-Chairman Harrie F. Flynn, thanks friends of the Alhambra for their participation in this project and invites them to this dedication ceremony. Provisions are made to accommodate a large attendance.

\$2,500 Gift Given Fisher For Research

The "United States Atomic Energy Commission" has awarded St. John Fisher College a Research Contract for \$2,500. It was announced today by the Very Rev. Charles J. Lavery, president.

The contract is to support an investigation of the spallation of Neodymium 150 with high energy protons. The College provides the facilities and personnel for the research project.

THIS STUDY is being made in collaboration with the Nuclear Chemistry Research Group at the University of Rochester. Dr. Clarence Heininger, Jr. of St. John Fisher College is the principal investigator. Dr. Edwin O. Wigg directs the nuclear chemistry group at the University of Rochester.

Bishop Presides At Dedication Of New Elmira Heights Church

More than 700 parishioners, representatives of the contracting firms and friends from throughout the Diocese of Rochester filled the new St. Charles Borromeo church in Elmira Heights last Sunday morning to assist at the first Mass and dedication ceremonies.

Bishop James E. Kearney was the celebrant of the Mass and delivered the dedication sermon.

BISHOP KEARNEY said the new church was "worthy to serve as the tabernacle of our Savior — from which countless blessings are going to flow, not only to those who worship in this church, but to all in the community."

"Just as in the days when our Lord walked this earth we are told that power and goodness went out from Him, so also, the power of that same God will go out from these walls to everyone who believes in God and His Son, Jesus Christ," he said.

Assisting the Bishop as chaplains were Father Francis J. Reilly, pastor of St. Mary's Church, Horseheads, and Father Joseph M. McNamara, chaplain at the Youth Reception Center in Elmira.

Very Rev. Msgr. Edward J. McAniff, secretary to the Bishop, was master of ceremonies. Rt. Rev. Msgr. Leo G. Schwab, V.F., and Rt. Rev. Msgr. Francis J. Lane were in the sanctuary.

The church was open for public inspection starting at 2 p.m. and it was estimated that more than 1,000 people filed through the beautiful new church within a matter of a few hours.

Father Joseph G. Merkel personally greeted the long lines of visitors and accompanied many of them on a tour of the church.

Open house, with aides to assist, will take place every Sunday during the summer months from 2 to 3 p.m.

Ithaca School Marks 75 Years

Ithaca — Seventy-five years of Catholic school education in Ithaca will be commemorated on May 28th at a celebration and tribute to the Sisters of St. Joseph who have staffed the school since its opening on Sept. 8, 1884.

The day's activities will begin with a Solemn High Mass at 9 a.m. in Immaculate Conception Church. Children of the school and members of the St. Cecilia choir will sing the Mass.

A LUNCHEON will be held in the school cafeteria at 12:30 p.m. and will be attended by about sixty guests. The speaker for the luncheon will be the Rev. William Roche, Diocesan Superintendent of Schools. Mrs. Willis Cross is chairman of the luncheon.

An exhibit will be displayed in the school from 4 to 5 p.m. and during the evening from 7 to 9 p.m. All are invited to visit the school to view the work which the school children have executed to commemorate the event.

The first graduating class of Immaculate Conception School on June 26, 1885, comprised the following eight students: Patrick Carroll, Patrick Sheehy, Emma Maloney, Mary Robinson, Matthew Hines, Michael Nolan, Mary G. Maloney, Margaret Troy.

ONE OF THESE graduates, Michael Nolan, was ordained a priest on July 21, 1895. He celebrated Mass at the formal dedication of the present church which was held on September 11, 1898.

Another graduate of the first class, Margaret Troy, entered the Order of the Sisters of St. Joseph, taking the name of Sister Ferdinand. She taught in the schools of the Rochester Diocese for many years.

The first graduating class of Immaculate Conception School had 8 pupils; the 75th class had 42. Seven Sisters of St. Joseph comprised the first staff in 1884. At present there are 11 Sisters and 4 lay teachers on the staff and 654 pupils. When the school opened in 1884, there were 320 pupils enrolled.

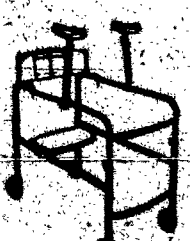
Dryden Women Hold Breakfast
