### Corning CDA Members Hear Father O'Malley

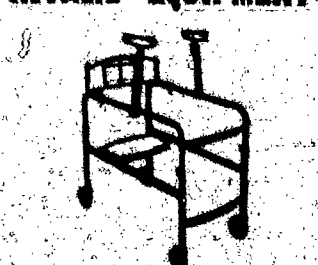

Mrs. Leo McKinney and Mrs. Earl Ginnane were co-chairmen of the arrangements with Mrs. McKinney acting as toastmistress.

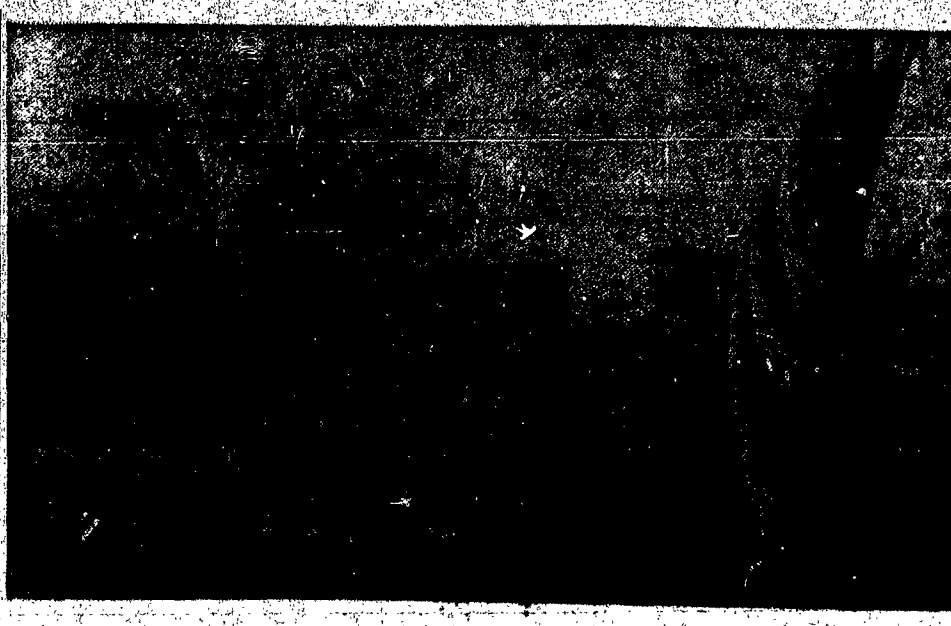
