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## At Our House 'Wasted' Space?

Trend in new housing, we note, is more and more toward the dining room as an integral part of the home — even the small house, the duplex and the apartment.  
A score or more years ago sophisticated housing began turning noses up, thumbs down on the dining room, denoting it "wasted space." The bandwagon rolled. Clients nodded agreement: "Why, of course, the dining room is used only once a day by most families. Why designate one-fourth to one-third of non-sleeping quarters to just a place for eating? Silly!"  
The realtors had won their point.  
And so, the dining quarters of countless homes became the stepchild of the living room. Neither fish, flesh, fowl, nor good red herring, it was a cramped off, perhaps set off from the living room with a screen, or "planters" — those three-foot shelves with rhododendron leaves stop. The table doubled-in-brass during non-eating hours as a swank long library table, complete with books, plants, objects of art, family photographs.  
CAME DINNER time, it meant a whole revamping of the picturesque setup — too much trouble as a day-by-day routine.  
So, except for special occasions, the family ate all meals in the kitchen. It is hard, most families find, to point up dinner time in such a setting. It becomes just another "eat-and-get-it-over-with" experience. This is too bad, for dinner time is the one part of the day when relaxation is natural, when the family members gather as friends and coworkers in the living room. A quick "flow" continuation of family unity.  
Now that dining rooms are "in" again (and they have never been "out" altogether), many new families and others moving into houses with such accommodations will find that the "wasted space" idea was pure fallacy — a commercial gimmick.  
"Once a day" Who said that? During long afternoons, where in the world would the home dresser find a cutting board comparable to the dining room table? Spread the length of material out, park pattern and pin.
