

Oblate Bishop Attends Aquinas Mission Rally

An Oblate Bishop and the first Negro priest to be ordained from the Rochester Diocese were among the guests of the students of Aquinas Institute in the school's final Mission assembly today.

Bishop Francis J. McSorley, O.M.L., Vicar of the Sea of Jolo in the Philippines, told the more than 1200 mission-minded boys about the Moslem Moros inhabitants of his diocese, who are a fearless race, contemptuous of pain, ruthless fighters with an intense hatred for all things Christian.

Bishop McSorley, who was in Rome by the papal plane during World War II, spoke of the zealous American Oblate missionaries who have proved that bigotry and hatred of the Moros can be broken down and converts made among them.

FATHER CHARLES HALL, S.S.J., ordained last Saturday in Washington, D.C., spoke briefly of his student days at Aquinas. Father Hall, ordained in the Society of Saint Joseph, was graduated from Aquinas in 1950. The entire student body gave Father Hall a standing ovation when he was presented by Rev. Raymond L. Prince, C.S.B., moderator of the Aquinas Mission Unit.

Other newly ordained priests present on the stage who were former Aquinas students were: Rev. John Lynch and Rev. William Flynn, both ordained last Saturday for the Diocese of Rochester and Rev. Cyril Knapp, O.F.M., who will soon leave for Puerto Rico to take his first missionary assignment.

Rev. Charles V. Erb, S.V.D., Rochester native and a member of the Society of the Divine Word, spoke of his recent tour of Africa and Europe. Father Erb, always a popular speaker at Aquinas, commended the Mission spirit of the Aquinas students.

Acting in his capacity as diocesan director of the Propagation of the Faith, Rev. George S. Wood, an Aquinas graduate, presented the annual awards of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade.

Receiving the coveted Palatin Award, was David Perry of St. Salome parish. Perry served as student moderator of the Aquinas Mission Unit. Paul Rizzo and Peter Shaughnessy were invested in the Order of St. Louis the Crusader as an indication of their missionary zeal.

FATHER WOOD also called attention to the high quality of the AQUINAS official Aquinas mission paper, which received a student Palatin press award from the national headquarters in Cincinnati.

Close to the heart of every Aquinas student is the Basilian Fathers' Mission Centre. Throughout the years hundreds of dollars have been sent to the Bishop of Galveston to continue the important work of caring for the Moslem people in Mexico. Father John Collins, C.S.B., of the Basilian Fathers' Mission Centre, expressed his gratitude.

"When I think of what a wonderful thing it is for all the boys at Aquinas who go gener-

ously give their prayers as well as their pennies and nickels," Father Collins wrote, "it fills my heart. I am incapable of expressing what I feel or of doing justice to the credit that belongs to the Mission Society of Aquinas."

Father Prince closed the day's program by paying tribute to the guests and to Rev. E. O'Reilly, C.S.B., Mission Unit director, Rev. Charles Pflieger, C.S.B., and William McCarthy, assistants.
