Theatre in Need of Rescue

A keynote address by actress Peggy Wood and presentation of the first Religious Drama Award were highlights of a special convention of the National Catholic Theatre Conference held June 10-12 in Rochester's Hotel Manger.

Widely known for her portrayal of Mamma in the long-time TV series "I Remember Mamma," Miss Wood discussed "theatre in a changing world," theme of the three-day convention at the opening session.

United States and Canada. Besides business meetings, the convention program included tours of the Eastman Kodak Co. auditorium, the George Eastman House and Dryden Theatre, where delegates viewed a presentation of Laurence Olivier's film "Henry V."

Performances of "Princess Beauty" by Nazareth College and "Peter Pan" by Blessed Sacrament School were also featured. The convention was especially dedicated to the "Children's Theatre."

Omar K. Lerman, assistant to the producer of New York's Phoenix Theatre, was guest speaker at the closing banquet on June 12. He said that the Phoenix led the off-Broadway movement from its founding in 1933 to the present day offering audiences the classics, avant-garde productions and works of new playwrights.

Father Stapleton noted that the conference shared the off-Broadway ideal of a theatre for all of the people instead of the limited group that patronize the glamorous Broadway houses.
