

Irish Press World Renowned

Dublin—(NC)—An encouraging feature of Catholic life in Ireland today is the advance in the quality and influence of the Catholic press.

Circulation has risen steadily despite a flood of foreign news, papers and periodicals. And in this competition may lie the key to the new professional quality of Catholic journalism.

Some years ago the majority of Catholic periodicals in Ireland could be classified as mere pious leaflets, full of devotional stories and simple spiritual features. The pattern has changed radically.

Today's Catholic journals are on the whole alert to contemporary issues and deal with them expertly from a reporter's and editorial point of view.

At the same time they preserve Ireland today in a distinctly Catholic orientation.

IRELAND HAS only three specifically Catholic weeklies: The Irish Catholic, the Standard, and Hibernia.

All are published in Dublin. The Irish Catholic, the Standard, and Hibernia, have a wide circulation in Ireland.

Although the number of Catholic magazines published in Ireland varies from year to year, a survey of 24 major ones indicates that they have a combined circulation of about one million per issue.
