Eastern Rites Door To Church For Orientals

Birmingham — (RNS) — Auxiliary Bishop Fulton J. Sheen of New York predicted here that the "democratic qualities" of the Byzantine Rite of the Roman Catholic Church would make it a particularly appealing form of the Faith in China and Africa.

In his sermon at a Pontifical Mass held in connection with the third annual convention of the Melkite Rite Laymen's Association, the bishop, who is national director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, praised the contributions of the Byzantine Rite Catholics and especially the Melkites, who number some 375,000 and are found in the Middle East, the Americas and Australia.

Pointing up the diversity within Roman Catholicism, he said the Church needed 12 Rites just as it needs 12 apostles, and noted that "the Blessed Mother appeared in different clothing and spoke different languages in her various historical appearances."

"Shall not the Church," he added, "which is the reflection of the Holy Mother, celebrate the Christian Mysteries in different ways?"

Bishop Sheen was Patriarchal Legate to the convention representing Africa.

Serra Club Told

Desperate Need For Priests

Dallas — (NC) — The Church's "desperate need" for more priests was stressed by an Italian Cardinal in a message here to the 18th annual Serra International convention.

The message came from Rome's Giuseppe Cardinal Pio, head of the Sacred Congregation of Seminaries and Universities.

"THE MEMBERS of Serra who dedicate himself to the cause of the Holy Father would tell you, as I tell you in his name, laborers are few."

Bishop Named To Altoona

Washington — (NC) — The Most Rev. J. Carroll McCormick, Auxiliary Bishop of Philadelphia, has been appointed the fifth Bishop of Altoona-Johnstown, Pa., by Pope John XXIII.

Bishop McCormick, 54, was named to succeed Bishop Howard J. Carroll, who died last March 21 in Washington, D.C., after a brief illness. Bishop Carroll, former general secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, had been Bishop of Altoona-Johnstown since January 2, 1958.

Earthquake Relief

\$2 1/2 Million Sent Chile

Washington — (NC) — Catholic Relief Service-National Catholic Welfare Conference had rushed relief supplies valued at \$2,581,587 to Chile by mid-June.

Msgr. Edward E. Swinerton, the agency's executive director, reported this to a meeting (June 21) in American National

Red Cross headquarters, where officials of voluntary relief agencies summed up and coordinated their Chilean work.

THE MONSIGNOR'S figure did not include the value of supplies acquired with funds from the special collection taken up in most U.S. churches following a June 6 CRS-NWC emergency appeal.

This appeal was made by CRS-NWC after President Eisenhower asked Americans to come to the assistance of Chile by contributing to voluntary agencies.

(In the Rochester Diocese, funds were sent to the Red Cross.)

The CRS-NWC assistance program is the largest in Chile, a nation rocked by natural disasters in recent weeks. The American National Red Cross program is next, having channeled to Chile more than \$1,000,000 in cash contributions and supplies valued at \$600,000.

The meeting at Red Cross headquarters was the second at which reports of relief work were made. The first was held June 2 at the White House.

The U.S. Ambassador to Chile, Walter Howe, addressed the meeting at Red Cross headquarters, saying that the agencies' efforts in behalf of the American people had added to the firm friendship between Chile and the United States.

Father Fire Sets Aims

Malin — (RNS) — Father Dominique Georges Fire, O.F.M., winner of the 1958 Nobel Peace Prize, said here that the aim of the meeting of all Nobel Peace recipients which he is promoting would be to help soften up the present "petrification" of the world into East and West blocs. The division, he emphasized, is an "obstacle to peace."

HONEST PROFIT

I don't know if you've ever seen it or not — but you must have! The big store downtown, with the screaming, garish signs plastered all over the windows — PRICES FLASHED, FORCED TO SELL, EVERYTHING MUST GO, WE'RE GIVING IT AWAY BECAUSE WE LOVE EVERYBODY.

It's a great show and it's worth a smile as you walk by. But I do hope you realize that this guy isn't going over the hill to the Poor House next week. On the contrary, he'll be waiting in Florida at the Fountainhead. You get exactly what you pay for. He looks on customers as suckers.

Because, you see, people aren't in business just for fun. They're in business for one thing only — money. A real estate company will be happy to find a buyer for your home, but the company isn't doing this just for kicks. They get a cut out of the pie. And they deserve it. This is business. Money in exchange for work. Profit.

It is likewise legitimate to make money without working. If you are smart, that is. When I was a kid, I offered to deliver circulars for a local grocery store at 35 cents for the job. I took the circulars, went to my stupid younger brother, asked him if he wanted to make 25 cents for delivering circulars (which he did); and I had ten cents and no sweat. This is using your brains and it is not crooked.

What would have been shady in this deal would be to take the guy's 35 cents and then chuck the circulars down the sewer. And this isn't ridiculous. It happened in my time and it happens today. Baby sitters who take money for a job, then fail to care or watch over the kids, but spend the evening doing the cha-cha with their dates who were smuggled through the back door, are guilty of dishonesty. In fact taking money for work that is never done, or done poorly, seems to be the capital sin among teenagers today.

Among some adults, business deals have become just a game in which every kind of sharp practice, slippery jockeying and clever chicanery are fair as long as you "get away with it." A simple rule for business dealing is the old golden rule. The way I want this bird to treat me, that's the way I ought to treat him.

Quake Proof Shrine Planned In Mexico

Mexico City — (RNS) — Reports that the ancient Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe — the most renowned church in Mexico — would be totally demolished this year to make way for a new \$3 million structure are somewhat premature, it was learned here.

High church officials denied that the 400-year-old basilica would be destroyed. However, they noted that a drive is under way to reconstruct the shrine. Two and a half miles north of Mexico City, it was built on the exact site where the Virgin Mary was said to have appeared to the humble Indian Juan Diego in 1531.
