500 Hibernians Attend State Conclave In Elmira

The 70th Biennial New York State Convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians and Ladies' Auxiliary closed Saturday night, June 25 at Elmira with the convention banquet and installation of state officers.

Some 500 delegates and guests attended the Mark Twain Hotel banquet and view the installation, ending the three-day convalescence of the Catholic, Irish fraternal organization.

The main speaker at the banquet was the Rev. Eugene B. Callagher, S.J., chairman of the auxiliary department of the University of Scranton.

FATHER CALLAGHER lauded the glorious history of Ireland, but reminded the group that the "greatest glory of Ireland lies in its future," citing the rapid growth of industries there since the nation gained its independence from Great Britain.

In clearing up a "misunderstanding" on the stand taken by Ireland in calling for a vote on Red China's admittance to the United Nations, he told conversations with high Irish officials.

These officials stressed that while the Irish delegation had called for a vote on the question, it was up to the group to put more light on the subject.

He emphasized that the Irish delegation fully intended to vote against admittance of Red China. Father Callagher explained further that the country's stand is a fight for "independence of speech" and a refusal to have major powers dictate policy and not allow "free expression and decision."

HE ALSO spoke of Ireland's role in World War II, reliving the conversation he had with England's Lord Halifax, who held the Jesuit priest that the Allies preferred to keep Ireland from declaring war, so that the Allies would not have to spread its manpower and equipment this by having to protect such vast expanse of Irish coastline.

Billion \$ Mark Passed By KC Insurance Dept.

New York, N.Y. — The Knights of Columbus has passed the billion-dollar mark in the amount of its insurance in force on the lives of its members, Supreme Knight John E. Hart announced this week at the quarterly meeting of the fraternal benefit society of Catholic men.

In the past three years, the insurance held by some 400,000 of the society's million-plus membership has increased by almost 50 per cent and is two and one-half times the amount in force as recently as eight years ago.

THE KNIGHTS have assets of more than \$100 million and, since their founding by Rev. Michael J. McGivney, in New Haven, Conn., in 1866, have paid more than \$100 million to members and their beneficiaries.

Noting the attainment of the billion-dollar goal he had set in 1956, Hart said: "Every member is proud of this result, which is a realization of the hopes and desires of the founder of our Order. Our membership is equally proud of our record in supporting his plan to put into effect religious and humanitarian works."

The annual international convention of the Knights will be held in Atlanta, Georgia, August 16-18.
