Sister comes from Saint Augustine's parish and was a student at Nazareth College before entering the Novitiate.

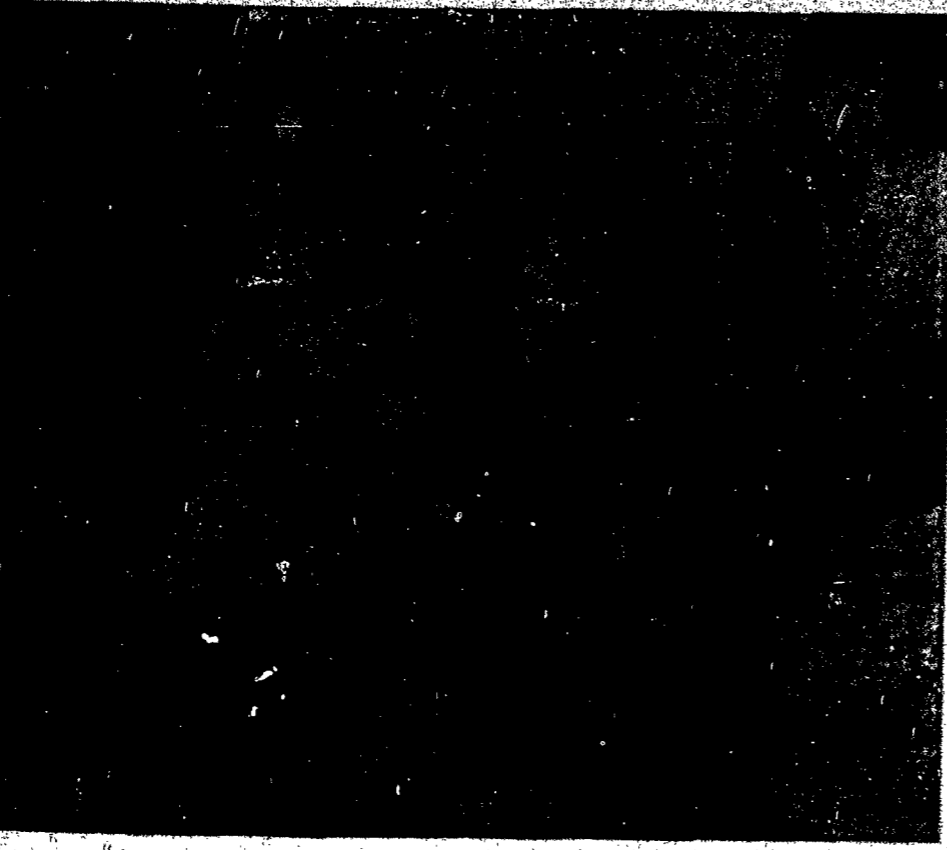
