Is this true: The United States and the Soviets are more interested in making more sacrifices to draw other nations into their respective political orbits than we Catholics are interested in doing to draw other nations to Christ? Do not political demonstrations against the United States in Japan and other mission lands disturb us more than persecutions against the Church in North Vietnam and China? Does politics dominate our thinking more than religion? Do we not read ten thousand lines about the international political situation to one line about the advance of the Kingdom of God among the people of the East?

The answer to these questions depends on the individual and his degree of faith. Where our treasure is, there are our hearts. If the love of Christ is primary in our hearts, then all else is seen through the crucified in these crucifying days, this is the form our thinking must take:

1. Political, economic and military power is passing from the West to the East. China with its present 600,000,000 under Communist rule could very well become the source of the West.

2. Whether the East and Africa thirty years from now will be inspired by Christian love or Socialist-Communist hatred of the West depends on the aid we give the Holy Father now through the Society for the Propagation of the Faith for mission lands.

3. We have reached a state in our spiritual lives where prayer alone is not enough. When the Apostles were persecuted by a devil they could not drive out, Our Lord told them they had to fast as well as pray. We are today face to face not with evil men but with the power of the devil. Repentation, self-denial, detachment from the world, making up for the sins of others, taking upon ourselves their guilt — this is the need of the hour. And hour it is — "This is your hour," said Our Lord as He went to His Passion.

Let not a day pass without an act of self-denial. Then at the end of the month send the fruits of your penances and fastings to the Holy Father through his Society for the Propagation of the Faith. The devil can be driven out of the world but only by prayer and fasting.

PRIESTS AND SISTERS

In God's plan for the redemption of mankind priests are essential; assisting priests in their work for the salvation of souls sisters play a paramount part. With hardly an exception, boys and girls in Mission countries who wish to become priests and sisters, are from families too poor to pay any part of the cost of educating their children. Seminaries and Novitiates in these areas depend on benefactors from other lands in order to operate.

To aid in the maintenance of Seminaries and Novitiates in the Near and Middle East the CATHOLIC NEAR EAST WELFARE ASSOCIATION has two DOLLAR-A-MONTH CLUBS — the CHRYSOSTOMS for Seminaries, MARY'S BANK for Novitiates. The money received through these Clubs is tremendous help to the administrators of the institutions training priests and sisters; the good accomplished by the Clubs proves that a little bit (\$1.00 a month) goes a long way.

A boy studying to be a priest must spend six years in a seminary; a girl training to be a nun must spend two years in a novitiate. \$800 is the cost of supporting a boy in the seminary for six years; \$800 is needed to support a girl in the novitiate for two years. The person who has the holy desire of financing the education of a priest or sister may send the money in installments — for a priest \$100 within the space of a year, for a sister \$150 within a year.

BELA RUZEK and SIDONIUS CACKA are two RUSSIAN boys preparing for the priesthood. Like most of the boys in the seminary with them, they come from extremely poor families. When the rector of the Seminary accepted them as students, he also accepted the responsibility of providing for their material necessities. You could help the seminary rector fulfill his responsibilities if you could "adopt" either BELA or SIDONIUS, or join the CHRYSOSTOMS.

The MISSIONARY SISTERS OF OUR LADY OF THE APOSTLES IN EGYPT have among their novices SISTER ANTOINETTE and SISTER SYLVANIE. Here again the Superior of the Community, when she accepted these two girls as novices, also assumed the responsibility of supporting them. This Superior is most grateful as are all Religious Superiors, to those who help them in their needs. 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At Home With Trudy McNall

CHERRIES — Sweet and Sour

July is the cherry month. Remember that fresh cherries are perishable so be sure to keep them under refrigeration until you are ready to use them. SELECT CHERRIES — mid-June to mid-August. California, Oregon and Washington are the big producers of sweet cherries, while New York, Michigan and Wisconsin are the big sour cherry states.

There are over 1,000 varieties of sweet and sour cherries but there are only half a dozen sweet cherries of commercial importance such as BING, by far the most important because of its excellent flavor and because it is a good shipper and keeper. "BING" was not named for the famous crooner, but given the name of a Chinese workman in the orchard of the man who first grew it in 1875.

Most sour cherries — Montmorency, Early Richmond, and English Morello — are quite perishable and are not, as a consequence, found for long on the fresh market. But when you CAN get fresh sour cherries, what's more delicious than a juicy cherry pie or some cherry tarts?

JULY IS THE month for home grown cherries and those locally grown and tree ripened have optimum color, flavor and sweetness. And what's more they cost less than those shipped in from other states. Enjoy fresh cherries before they disappear from the market. This year they will be in peak supply during this month, the sweet ones arriving right now and the sour cherries during the latter half of the month. This year's crop is expected to be greater than average for this state, however the national supply is estimated to be at 12 percent below average.

CHERRY TARTS — 4 T. quick cooking tapioca 1 c. sugar 1/2 t. salt 1 1/2 c. water 3 c. pitted fresh red sour cherries 10 to 12 baked 3 1/2 inch tarts

Combine tapioca, sugar, salt, water and cherries in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil. Cool, stirring occasionally. Chill. Fill tart shells with cherry mixture. Top with sweetened whipped cream or prepared dessert topping mix.

FRESH CHERRY PIE 4 c. fresh cherries (sour) pitted 1 c. sugar 3 T. cornstarch 1 T. butter

It is said in Colonial times that every house had a cherry tree in the yard. In fact I heard an interesting story of the affect a cherry tree had on the course of Broadway in New York City. Henry Brevoort's farm at 10th Street, where Grace Church now stands, had a cherry tree in the yard. In order to save it Broadway was angled west as it proceeded north across the island of Manhattan.

Cherries it would seem, have been an all time popular fruit in this country and though we use them as condiments for meat, preserves and jellies, probably the most popular use is in cherry pie or in tart such as you see in this picture. Make some for your family today.

White Fathers! Valhalla City — (NC) — The Sacred Congregation of Seminaries has elevated the White Fathers' house of studies at Manaba, Tunisia, to the rank of a pontifical institute.

Combine sugar and cornstarch. Add to fruit. Pour into pastry lined 9 inch pie pan. Make a lattice pastry top or use a solid top with vents cut for steam to escape. Bake at 450 degrees for 15 minutes, then reduce temperature to 375 degrees and bake for 35 to 40 minutes or until done.

HOW TO FREEZE A CHERRY PIE: Prepare a cherry pie making a solid top. Do not put vents in crust. Wrap in aluminum foil, cellophane, parchment paper or pillofilm. Seal, label and freeze. Storage — months. Unwrap, cut vent in top crust and bake at 400 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes or until done.

THE MOST abundant of the red-tart cherries is Montmorency. History doesn't tell us who Montmorency was, but his name is linked with the variety of cherries for which Kent, England is known and is attached to any French recipe that is garnished with a cherry sauce or cherries.

Sclerosis Victim Mother of Nine

Lake Worth — (NC) — It's a woman's world in the home of the Edward Newtons, where nine daughters sit around the family table and devotion to the Blessed Virgin is woven into the web of daily life.

Yet the woman who presides over this little world has been a victim of multiple sclerosis for 10 years. In 1950, after five years of marriage and five daughters, Rita Newton was stricken with the crippling disease. She was unable to walk or care for her children.

"THROUGH FAITH, prayer, determination and my good doctors, I progressed," she said. "I was told not to have any more children. Since then I have had five more plus three major operations."

Less than two years ago the Newtons lost their only son, who died suddenly from a heart ailment.

"By all medical laws I should be in a wheelchair today," Rita said. "Instead, I take care of my nine daughters and my husband, I cook, sew and keep house myself."

Ed Newton, who is a plasterer, brought his family to Florida last November from Southboro, Mass.

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
