Counseling For Married Available From Agency

Catholic Family Service, Elmira, offers counseling to both husbands and wives with their marital problems. The agency tries to help them overcome their troubles of mind, emotions, heart and soul, that they may better understand each other and therefore repair and strengthen their marriage.

Selfishness, lack of respect for each other, in-law interference, nagging wives, thoughtless husbands and unwise budgeting lead the couples into believing their only solution is a separation.

Strict confidence in marriage counseling, as in all agency cases, is as sacred as a physician's vow and all case workers are pledged to secrecy in their work.

CASES ARE brought to the attention of Mrs. James Owen, marriage counselor, from the courts, friends, neighbors, clergy, physicians and lawyers. Miss Mary E. Fitzgerald, executive director, assists the caseworkers in all agency problems.

The husband and wife are interviewed separately at first as each has his or her side to tell. This is later followed by joint interviews. Mrs. Owen will not accept a case unless both husband and wife agree to talk to her.

Alcoholism is one of the greatest problems that the caseworker has to cope with. The majority of alcoholics are men. The wife usually brings her plight to the counselor, then the husband is contacted to give his side. Usually a basic personality difference is the cause. Persuading the man or woman alcoholic to see a doctor or visit Alcoholics Anonymous.

is difficult as they are reluctant to recognize that they have a problem.

Unwise budgeting, causing large bills and high finance charges, is always a leading problem. Budget counseling is aimed at helping those involved to understand and adjust their ways of managing their money. The caseworker often will contact creditors and the bank in order to help solve their financial troubles.

MIXED MARRIAGES make up 60 per cent of their cases. Marriage vows not solemnized brings its problems of guilt when they realize they are living against God's laws. When this guilt until the arguing and unhappiness cause the couple to seek help. The caseworker will contact their priest and convince the couple of the need for a valid marriage.

Incompatibility arises over the inability of a couple to sit and talk to each other, especially over little things. If they could talk as freely and easily with each other, as they do with the case worker they wouldn't need counseling.

In infidelity cases, the un-
