# FBI Chief Warns Red Threat Grows

## American Youth Latest Target

Washington — FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover warned this week that U.S. Communists have "launched a major campaign with youth as its target."

His warning was voiced against the ominous rumble of stepped-up Communist activity around the world — in Cuba and the Congo — and a stiffer anti-religious drive behind the Iron Curtain.

Cuban Catholics twice this week battled Communist hecklers following Masses offered for victims of Red regimes.

Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev threatened to send troops to riot-torn Congo in Africa to "protect" the newly independent nation. The Kremlin leader also kept up his propaganda campaign to undermine the U.S. system of overseas bases by claiming another plane, this time an RB-47 reconnaissance bomber, violated Russian air territory.

The round-the-world spurt in Communist activity is seen as a stronger propaganda offensive from Moscow while Americans are concentrating on the presidential campaign or their own vacation plans.

Hoover's warning about increased Red activity in this country was made in a special report to the House Committee on Un-American Activities. He stated while in San Francisco where Communist inspired when the Committee held a two day investigating session in May in this west coast city.

THE FBI HEAD said college campuses in America are the "prime targets for Communist infiltration and recruitment."

Mr. Hoover also said: "The Communist movement in the United States is a serious and growing threat to our national security."

He called on "good Christians" to chase out of their churches "those who want to make the simpler trenches" against his revolutionary regime. About 500 of Cuba's 700 priests are Spanish.

Obviously disturbed by the demonstrations, one of which started inside Havana's Roman Catholic cathedral at the end of a Solemn High Mass for the victims of Communism, he derided "those false Christians who go to church to compare instead of to pray."

Throughout the world today, governments are teetering with a sinking rapidity. Whether large or small, the role Communists are playing in these events must not be discounted.

The growing strength of our nation over the years has not proven a deterrent to relentless efforts on the part of the U.S. Communist party to destroy our security and prepare our nation for a similar fate.

"Looking at the riots and chaos Communists have created in other countries, many Americans point to the strength of our nation and say 'It can't happen here.' The Communist success in San Francisco in May 1960 proves that it can happen here."

# Issues, Not 'Nonsense'

The priest said he was not endorsing Sen. Kennedy.

"I can't conceive of the Catholic Church entering into politics save in cases where the Church was being deprived of its right to exist and function. I don't think that would ever happen in the United States," Cardinal Cushing said.

## Heads Missions

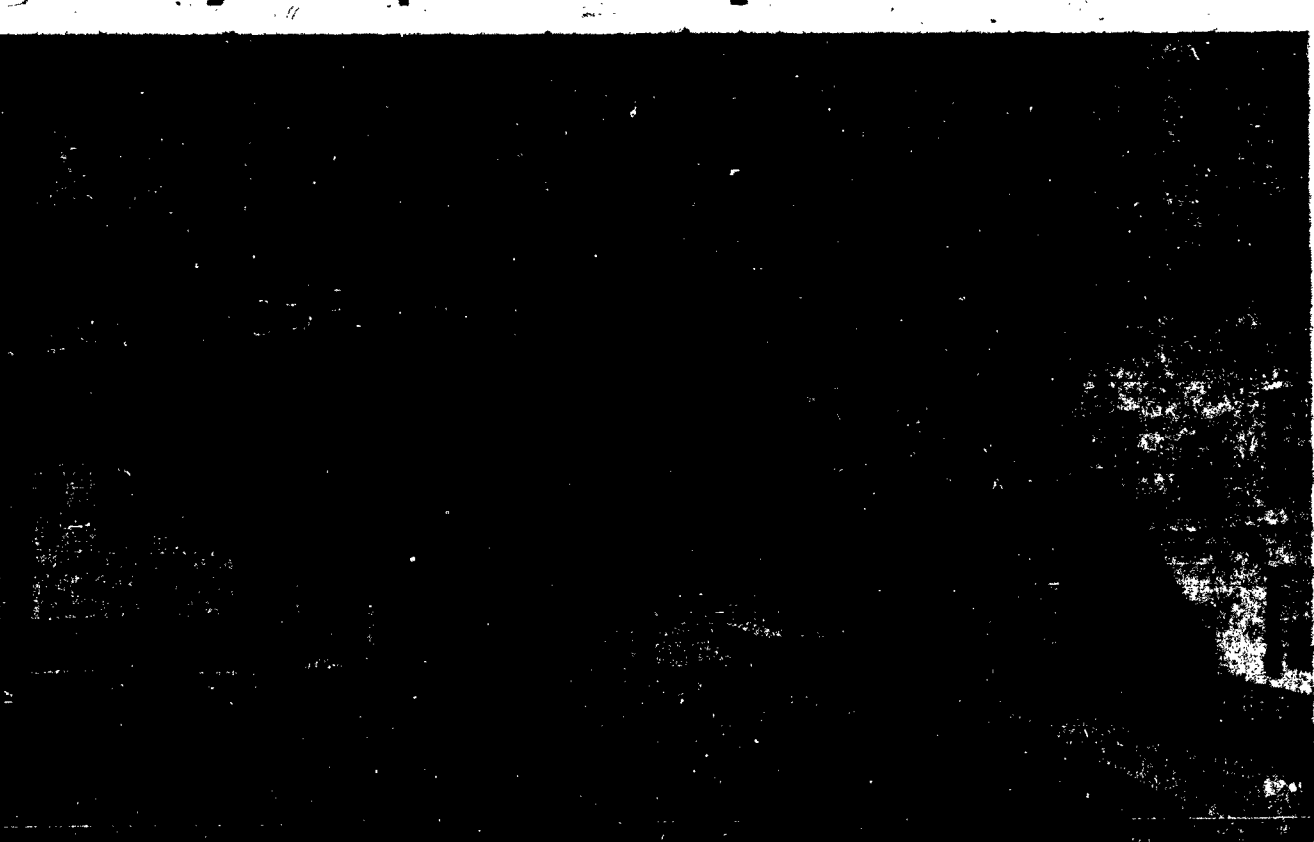
