

## Time For Cook-Outs

Get out the barbecue and let's all have a good old-fashioned family cook-out. It's time again when everyone wants to "move outdoors," and the cook-out is the perfect time to do it. Informal menus become the order of the day. Food seems to taste better when you eat it outdoors and by using paper plates, cups, napkins and the like, the clean up is kept to a minimum of effort and time.

With the popularity of the outdoor meal comes the problem of serving something just a little different, yet easy to prepare and serve. Tossed green salads fit into any menu, and as far as I am concerned, are almost a necessity. It is a perfect food to include in your menu and you can vary this by using a selection of greens, by adding an unusual ingredient or two, such as raw zucchini slices or chopped ripe olives, and with a special dressing to serve with the salad.

I HAVE A new idea for serving the All American hamburger. Why not stuff two with some regular seasoned bread and celery dressing, and bake with a barbecue sauce while broiling? Or split frankfurters with cheese and chopped onion and wrap with partially fried bacon before grilling.

Vegetables are wonderful skewered and broiled over the barbecue. Use a variety such as tomatoes, onions, green peppers, eggplant, zucchini, fresh mushrooms... and for extra flavor marinate them in your favorite Italian or French dressing before cooking.

Try this new idea for a summer barbecue. It's double hamburger filled with seasonal dressing and basted with a tangy barbecue sauce. Accompany with fresh vegetable kabobs marinated in French dressing.

**BARBECUED STUFFED HAMBURGERS**  
3 pounds ground beef  
1 egg  
Seasoned salt  
3 cups packaged stuffing  
1/2 c. diced celery  
1/4 c. minced onion  
1/4 c. melted butter  
1/4 c. water  
Method: Season ground beef with egg, seasoned salt, and pepper. In bowl, combine packaged stuffing, celery, onion, melted butter and water; mix until well blended. Form ground meat into 16 large thin round patties. Place a spoonful of stuffing in the center of the patty, leaving 1 inch around edges unworked. Top with the other 3 patties. Pinch edges of ground beef patties together to seal in stuffing, chill until ready to barbecue. When ready to cook place about 6 inches from coals. Baste well with barbecue sauce and grill about 10 1/2 minutes. Turn, baste with sauce and grill another 6 or 8 minutes or till done. Makes 8 large double hamburgers.

### BARBECUE SAUCE

1/2 t. curry powder  
1/2 t. paprika  
1/2 t. chili powder  
1/2 t. salt  
1 t. sugar  
Black pepper  
Garlic salt  
1 T. vinegar  
1 T. Worcestershire sauce  
1 T. ketchup  
10 T. water

Combine all ingredients for sauce and simmer for 10 minutes.

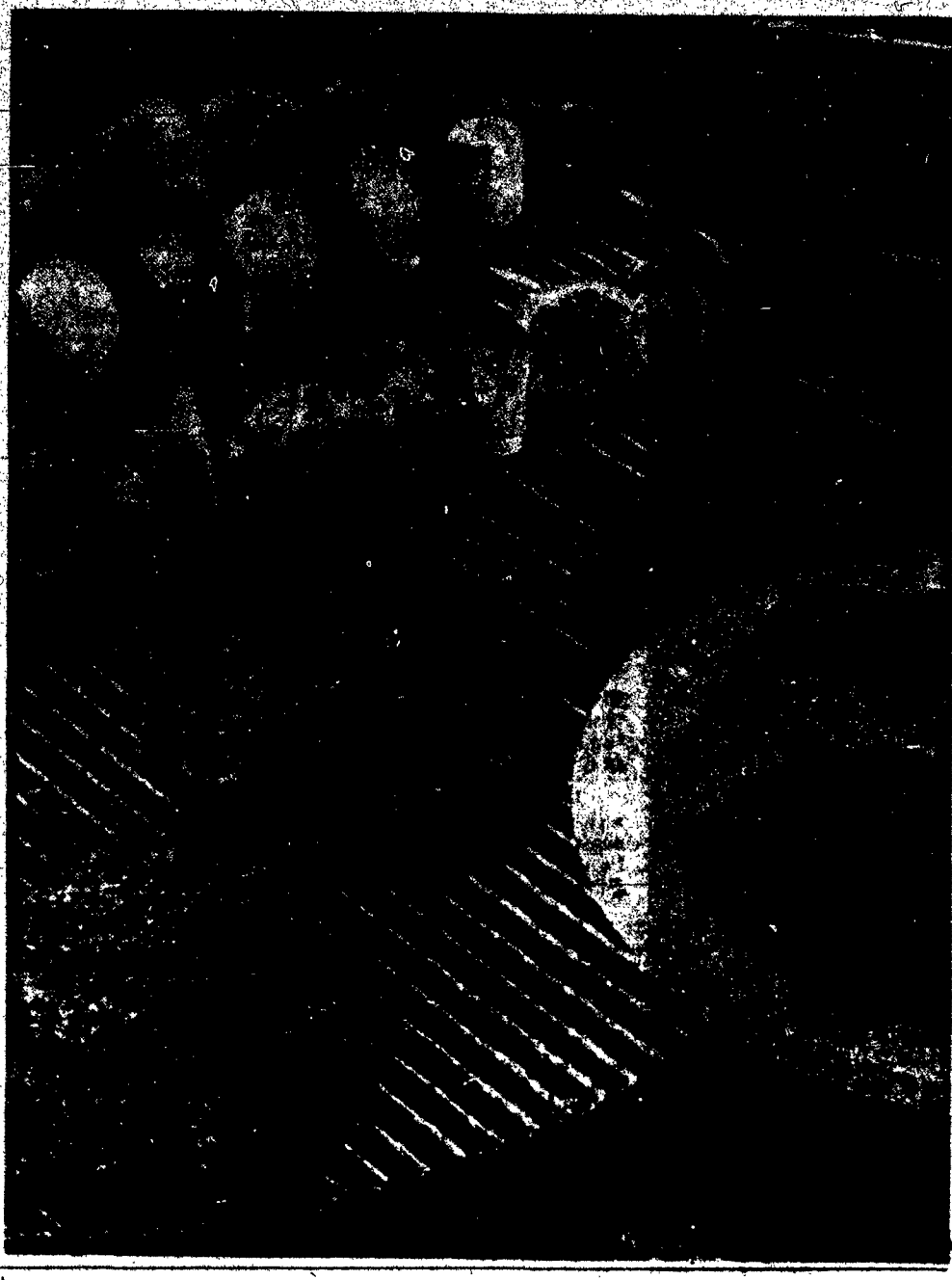
### MARINATED FRESH VEGETABLE KABOBS

8 small white onions, peeled  
8 ripe cherry tomatoes or 2 medium size quarts  
1 small eggplant, cut into 3 inch cubes  
1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, washed and cleaned  
1 medium pepper, cubed  
1 package Italian French salad dressing mix

Method: Prepare fresh vegetables and place in pan for marinating. Prepare package of Italian-French Salad Dressing mix according to package directions. Pour over vegetables and marinate several hours. Skewer vegetables on skewers, combining onions, green peppers or fresh mushrooms, eggplant and tomatoes together. Place on grill 3-4 inches above coals and grill for about 15 to 20 minutes or till vegetables are done.

Rochester and area residents captured four top prizes in the June list of winners in the Louis A. White Fishing Contest, according to results just released by the judges.

Laura Gelsler of 466 Maple St., Rochester, placed first in the Perch division, outdistancing her male competitors with a 3 lb. 2 oz. Lake Ontario entry.

Edward J. Byrne, 13 North Park, Auburn, placed first in the Walleyed Pike class as Chester Zitter, 104 North Union St., Rochester, and Harold Walters, RDS, Naples, took first honors in the Rainbow Trout and Smallmouth Bass divisions.

ERNEST FORBES, Gorham, and Julian D. Rogers, Ovid, placed second and third in the Perch division; Erwin Brown, RD2, Penn Yan, won second prize with his 9 lb. 8 oz. Brown Trout; Lucian F. Hamann, Corning, and Herbert Danzico, 18 Cherry St., Geneva, were winners in the Rainbow Trout segment, while Arlie Hamard, 48 Westview Terrace, Rochester, won second place in the Smallmouth Bass class.

Largest fish entered in June was the 18 lb. 9 oz. Northern Pike caught in Farn Lake by Cassius Bruce of Wilmington. The smallest, a one pound, two ounce Rock Bass entered by Daniel Small of Williamsville took third money in that segment.

## Sepulchre Church Near Collapse

Jerusalem — (RNS) — Premier Hazza al-Majall of Jordan, acting on the personal instructions of King Hussein, announced that a special committee of top local architects will be set up to study the "dangerous state" of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in the Jordan-controlled Old City here.

Regarded as the holiest shrine in Christendom, the ancient church was originally built during the reign of Roman Emperor Constantine the Great on the traditional site of Christ's Crucifixion.

THE PRESENT church is largely the one of 12th and 13th century Crusaders. It was severely damaged by earthquake in 1977, by fire in 1949 and by unusually heavy rains last year. Restoration work began in 1958, but it has been estimated that \$1,500,000 will be needed to complete repairs.

Premier Majall said that in setting up the committee, he acted on recommendations of the well-known Brown International Construction Company and man Catholic hierarchy was warned of the threatened collapse of some of its wings. He will continue until at least the end of 1981, officials said. It is a report specifying what has to be far mended about \$10,000,000 this year.

The Protestant "Breed for the World" campaign was launched last Christmas by the Evangelical Church in Germany and the German Evangelical Free Churches.
