New School Ceremonies Held In Bath

Bath — Groundbreaking ceremonies for the construction of the \$183,770 St. Mary's School here were conducted Sunday afternoon.

The first shovelful of dirt was turned by the Rev. John F. O'Malley, pastor of St. Mary's Church. The second shovel was turned over by Peter Langendorfer who will be a member of the school's first kindergarten class.

Assisting Father O'Malley was Father Xavier Wilk, assistant pastor.

Steuben County Judge Dominick L. Gabrieli described the school construction as a milestone in the parish and a milestone in the community.

JUDGE GABRIELI was chairman of a fund drive which raised \$135,000 for the construction of the elementary school last fall.

Sister Magdalen, mother general of the Sisters of Mercy Convent at Rochester, was a special guest. The general contractor for the new school is the Robert Burnet Co. of Batavia.

Contracts will be signed today at St. Mary's Rectory and it is planned to have the first floor of the split level building completed for kindergarten and first and second grade classes this fall.

Eventually the school will be composed of eight grades. The Sisters of Mercy will provide the teaching staff.

Father Baker's Anniversary Set In Basilica

THE 24th anniversary of the death of Father Baker will be observed July 29 in the Basilica of Our Lady of Victory which he built in Lockport (on the edge of Buffalo) while in his eighties. Rt. Rev. Henry S. Shaw, who was an assistant pastor during the construction of the Shrine, will preach the sermon at the annual 10 o'clock Mass.

After the Mass, the usual procession to the grave will be followed by free guided tours of the Basilica and the Infant Home. A prime point of interest is the Memorial Rooms, into which furniture from Father Baker's study and his bedroom have been moved to permit inspection.

Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph M. McPherson, General Manager of Our Lady of Victory Home, announced that he expected to have the publication schedule of the first biography of the Padre of the Poo since his death ready for visitors. Floyd Anderson is the author.

More Jesuit Schools? 'Depends on Manpower'

The head of the Jesuit order's newest province visited McQuaid High School, Rochester, Tuesday of the past week.

Father James J. Shanahan, a native of Sonora, is superior of the "few more than 300 Jesuits" of the just established Buffalo (upstate) province.

Whether or not his order expands facilities for more students "depends on manpower," he said.

He talked with Father Robert Boyle, new rector at McQuaid, and reported in some New York City area schools staffed by Jesuits "3000 boys applied and all we could accept was 250."

He regretted, "We had to turn some away from McQuaid High School too but no where near that New York number."

FATHER SHANAHAN said, "If the many young men who have the idea of becoming a priest would only carry it through, we could soon build scores of more classrooms. We would, of course, need money for such a vast building program, but we need men even more."

The new Jesuit provincial, an Army Air Corps chaplain during World War II, and ten years head of St. Peter's College in New Jersey is the son of the late Dr. and Mrs. William Shanahan of Sonora. Dr. Shanahan was a pioneer in neurology and psychiatry and was widely known in medical circles for his exploratory research in these fields.

How do McQuaid students rank with graduates of other Jesuit schools?

Father Shanahan said they

are "outstanding." The Rochester school, opened in 1954, is still a youngster in an order with traditions dating back 400 years to St. Ignatius Loyola.

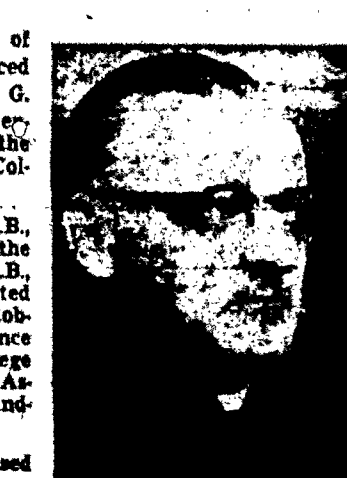
Father Flood has been in the college since its founding and in fact began his work prior to the opening of the college through the processing of the original collection of 30,000 volumes given to the college by the late Father Bernard Gelfell of E. Rochester.

FATHER LAVERY, the president of the College, in paying tribute to Father Flood for his work in building the College library said "history alone will record accurately the masterful work of Father Flood and his assistants in making the St. John Fisher collection of books and periodicals so renowned in such a short period of time."

A library is the heart and essence of any college or university, and there is no doubt, Father Lavery said, that the excellence of the library was one of the reasons that the college received its accreditation in such a short time after the opening of the College. Father Flood has been truly one of the pioneers and founders of the St. John Fisher College, the college president stated.

While on the staff of the local men's college, Father Flood authored and published a volume of poetry entitled, "The Bashful Chair."

Father Flood will begin his new duties at Assumption Institute of Medieval Studies in Windsor at the beginning of September.

These altars are located behind the main altar and below the mosaic of Christ in Majesty. The windows above the altars are transparent alabaster leaded in the same manner as stained glass windows.

THE WINDOWS portray the Five Glorious Mysteries of the Rosary and their prototypes from the Old Testament.

November 12 will be Catholic Daughter day at the Shrine and ceremonies dedicating the altars will be held.
