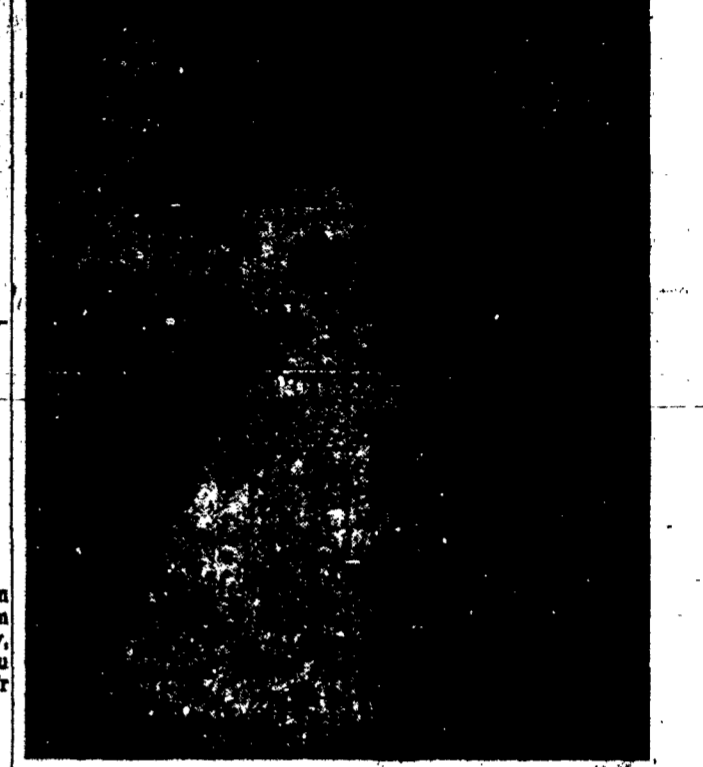


Family Picnic Planned By Canisteo Parishioners
