

Columbian Squires Mark 35 Years Of KC Service

The priest glanced hurriedly about the sacristy looking for his missing altar-boy. At the minute hand crept closer to the hour, he resigned himself to the fact that Johnny was not going to show up that morning.

He finally took a box of matches and walked out to the altar to light the two candles for the Low Mass.

Coming back to the sacristy, he waited a couple of minutes beyond the hour and then put on his chalice, and started to say his Mass.

After making his preparations at the altar, he was about to step down and pick up the two cruets when the gate opened and two young teenagers whom he recognized as former altar boys took their places and served the rest of the Mass.

AFTER THE Mass was over and the priest had followed the two boys back into the sacristy, he thanked them for their assistance at his Mass. They protested "But this is our job, Father. Our Circle of Columbian Squires has set up an emergency altar boy squad during the summer as its Service Project."

Father was amazed and asked the boys more details about this project. He learned that each morning two members of the Circle were assigned to attend Mass just in case the regular altar boys did not show up. He was further amazed to find that other Circles were conducting this project throughout the United States and Canada.

The above example is one of the many Service Projects being carried on by Catholic boys who are known as Columbian Squires.

The Columbian Squires organization is celebrating its 35th Anniversary on August 14. The Columbian Squires is an organization of Catholic boys of high school age sponsored by the Knights of Columbus in the Rochester Diocese there are Columbian Squires groups in Auburn, Elmira and Shortsville. The first meeting of the Knights thirty-eight years ago at a St. Columbus held in Atlantic City the delegates acted on a them to set up a youth program.

Supreme Knight James A. Flaherty named a committee composed of Deputy Supreme Knight Martin Carmody, the then Supreme Advocate and present Supreme Knight Luke E. Hart; and Supreme Directors George H. Boivin, John F. O'Neill, and Edward Houfman.

THIS COMMITTEE spent three years studying and planning a rounded program for Catholic youth. As a result of its activities, the famed Knights of Columbus Boy Guidance Course on a graduate level was launched at the University of Notre Dame in 1924. Nearly two hundred men attended and received a graduate degree from this course. These men have gone on to influence youth work in the intervening years.

The other major contribution of this committee was the Columbian Squires program. The first Circle, later known as the Brother Barnabas Circle, was formed at Duluth, Minnesota before the delegates to the Supreme Meeting in 1925. Circle No. 1 is still active and is a model in the program today.

Today, thirty-five years later, Columbian Squires units are scattered from Maine to Florida and New Jersey to California in the United States, and from Nova Scotia to British Columbia in Canada, throughout the whole group of Philippine Islands, from tip to tip on the island of Cuba, and from coast to coast in the Republic of Mexico. There are also units in Puerto Rico.

The secret to the success of the Columbian Squires program has been its emphasis upon a youth-run organization. The Columbian Squires program is self-financed, its activities are planned by its members, and it even elects its own officers. In the Columbian Squires the youth is given the responsibility. As a result, the program reaches its objective which is to train these young people for Catholic leadership.

COLUMBIAN SQUIRES are not squares. As a matter of fact, they have a lot of fun. They have found that an activity may be enjoyable without being frivolous, that learning need not be formal, and that there is a little bit of labor in leisure.

Men from the Knights of Columbus serve as advisors to the Columbian Squires and a real comradeship builds up between these two groups.

There is a real bond of fraternity built up among Columbian Squires of different Circles and Cuba have maintained an exchange program for a number of years. Here two representatives of each area journey to the other on an exchange basis for a two-week period. This has helped to develop understanding and both groups make out well despite the language barrier.

The Squires themselves were represented at this year's Golden Anniversary White House Conference and the representatives amazed many of the delegates by their wisdom and poise which was far beyond their years.

As the program reaches this milestone of thirty-five years, the Squires are not content to remain as they are but plan to improve their programs and expand the opportunities so that every Catholic boy will have a chance to be a member of the best program ever organized for the adolescent boy.
