Funeral Mass for Louis J. Hohman was celebrated by his son, the Rev. Louis J. Hohman, Jr. in St. Thomas More Church, Monday, August 1.

Mr. Hohman, 63, vice president of Hart Food Stores died July 29, 1960, at his home, 138 Kilbourne Rd., Buffalo, after an illness of several months.

Headlining the "Lorton Jazz Festival," as it is known will be two all-star jazz groups. Count Basie with Joe Williams and Louis Armstrong with Velma Middleton.

**THE THREE** priests producing the show, priest chaplains for the District of Columbia, are Father Carl J. Breitfeller, O.P., Donald F. Ebbey, O.P., and Nicholas J. Reid, O.P.

Father Breitfeller, a native of Columbus, O., originated the idea of the festival five years ago when, at his request Sarah Vaughan sang before 1,700 prisoners at a capacity audience in the prison auditorium.

Since then, one day each year, the men of Lorton have had their annual jazz festival and it has come, in addition to Miss Vaughan, such performers as Jack Teagarden, the Billie's, Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers, the Kai Winding Sextet, Ella Fitzgerald, the Oscar Peterson Trio, Stan Kenton and many others.
