Washington — (RNS) — The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission announced a new research grant of \$40,170 to the Catholic University of America to assist in investigations of factors that limit the rapid identification of materials by nuclear techniques. The university has a nuclear reactor on its campus.

Reds Say Eucharistic Congress Hate Meeting

Berlin — (RNS) — Sharp attacks in the Soviet zone press on the 37th International Eucharistic Congress which opens in Munich on July 31 caused fear in Catholic circles that the Communist government may not permit East German Catholics to attend the gathering.

Concern was prompted especially by articles in Neueste Deutschland and other papers denouncing the congress as aimed at stirring up "revenge and hatred" against the Communist camp.

THE ARTICLES referred particularly to the scheduled participation of members of the West German armed forces in the Eucharistic celebrations and a planned, international rally of enlisted men and officers of NATO and representatives of the "Fascist army" of Generalissimo Francisco Franco of Spain.

They charged that the congress will "doubtless" be played in the service of the West German government's "hostile anti-peace policy."

The Communist press charges were supported by the Christian Democratic Union (CDU), Communist-controlled counterpart of the West German party of the same name, which said "Soviet Zone Catholics cannot join the company of militarists and NATO henchmen."
