

St. Mary's To Graduate 49, Largest Class Expected

Plans for welcoming the largest class in its history to the student body of St. Mary's School of Nursing are underway at the Genesee St. campus.

Seventy new members, forty-two of whom will reside on campus, will formally embark on their nursing careers on Wednesday morning, Sept. 7, when they will be officially greeted by the Director of Nursing, Sister Maria, Resident students will arrive the afternoon before.

Wednesday's activities will open the orientation program with registration, tours of the hospital, and introduction of the new Class of '63 to Sister Teresa, hospital administrator.

A Big and Little Sister Picnic Supper will be held that evening on the school campus. Members of the Junior Class will serve as "Big Sisters" to the new Freshmen.

"Breakfast with the Faculty" will be the highlight of Thursday morning's activities. Some twenty-one members of the faculty will decorate the hospital cafeteria and serve breakfast to the new class.

A MEETING WITH their glass advisors will launch the Class of 1963 as a school organization in the early afternoon. The student body will then participate in Moving Day Exercises with the blessing and conferring of new caps to Seniors and Juniors and "beanies" to the Freshmen.

On Friday of Orientation Week, the Freshmen will formally meet the housekeeper and housemothers as well as the officers of the Student-Faculty Association. They will attend their first class on this day also.

Formal opening of the school year will take place on Monday, Sept. 12, when Bishop Kearney celebrates Mass in the school auditorium and addresses the students and faculty.

Eleven of the seventy incoming students of the Freshman Class at St. Mary's Hospital School of Nursing have received scholarships to pursue nursing studies, Sister Maria, Director of Nursing announced today. Of this number, three were awarded directly by St. Mary's Hospital and one by the Alumnae Association of the School of Nursing.
