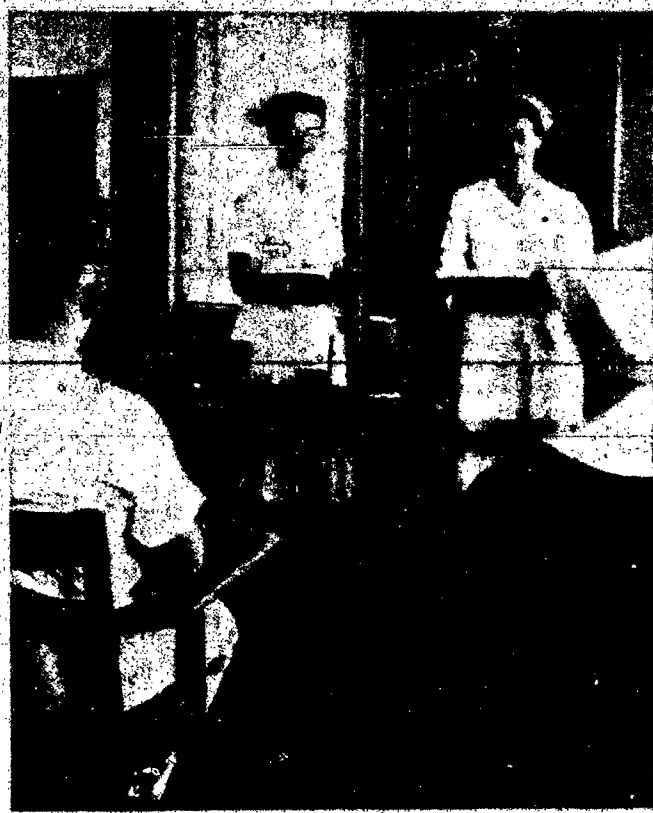

St. Mary's Hospital Holds First Faculty Institute

The first annual Faculty Institute of St. Mary's Hospital, outlined from a layman and that beset for the faculty the four-week program which every student at St. Mary's follows while on affiliation at Mt. Morris.

The Institute, which brought some 30 instructors together in conference, was designed to acquaint new faculty members with the philosophy and objectives of the School of Nursing and to coordinate the varied aspects of the nursing curriculum.

St. Mary's is expecting a record enrollment of 70 new freshmen students on Wednesday, Sept. 7, and has implemented its faculty to meet these expanding needs.

Sister Maria, Director of Nursing, in opening the Institute, urged that the greatest importance be placed on the goal of educating, not merely a nurse, but a Catholic nurse. Sister also announced the inauguration of a Faculty Education In-Service Program to continue the work begun in the Institute.

SISTER TERESA, Administrator of St. Mary's Hospital, welcomed the new faculty with the statement: "While you are here, join with us (the Daughters of Charity), dedicate yourself to this hospital. . . . The faculty can only give the students what we have. Often it is not only what we say but what we do."

The Rev. John V. Rosse, hospital chaplain, stressed that the faculty bears the major responsibility in maintaining the spirit of the school. Father Rosse outlined a program to accomplish this spiritual end and added: "By your spirit you can instill the proper motivation in your students."

Miss Ruth Negus, Director of Education at the Visiting Nurse Service of Rochester, where a large percentage of St. Mary's student nurses affiliate, for training in public health nursing, discussed the relationship of her program with that of St. Mary's. She said: "Our student program fosters this relationship and, consequently, brings about the ultimate goal which is better total-patient care."

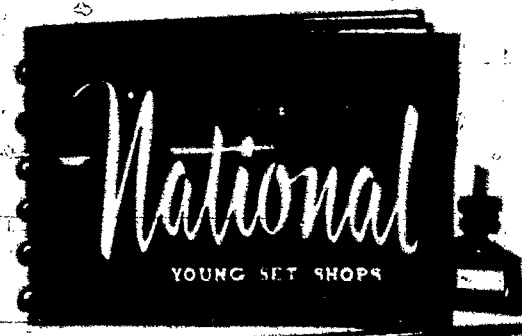
