Donation Appeal Made By St. Joseph House

An appeal for donations of tomatoes and canning jars — with the purpose of feeding needy and transient men next winter — came this week from the group which conducts St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, 402 South Ave.

From 80 to 100 men are given free meals daily at the House, which as in its 19th year of this service to the community. Clothing also is distributed.

Since the House is not staffed sufficiently to pick up donations, the appeal points out that persons who wish to contribute canning jars or tomatoes may leave them there at any hour of the day or evening. The building is near the intersection of South and Mt. Hope Avenues.

TWICE-WEEKLY canning sessions have been scheduled beginning Sept. 12 and continuing each Monday and Wednesday evening until the tomato supply is exhausted. Anyone wishing to help will be welcome.

The group also announced that the annual Labor Day Mass will be celebrated in the House chapel at 8 a.m. Monday, Sept. 5. It will be offered by the Rev. Raymond M. Kenny of St. Andrew's Seminary faculty, chaplain of the House.

In order to continue feeding scores of men daily, the House depends on contributions of money and on donations by markets, groceries and other institutions.

Currently weekly donations include bread from the Trappist Monastery in Piffard, as rector of admissions.
