## GOD LOVE YOU!

Seven hundred years before Our Blessed Lord was born, Isaiah the prophet described Him as the "suffering servant." St. Paul, looking back on the life of Christ, said: "He took upon himself the form of a servant. He was a suffering servant." It was particularly on the night of the Last Supper that Our Blessed Lord lived up to that title of slave or servant. He laid aside his garments which are the marks of status and dignity to signify how He laid aside the glory of His divinity in becoming a man. He girded Himself with a towel which is the mark of a slave, for in the East, the slave wore a towel about him as waiters today wear aprons. He poured water into a basin which was a kind of symbol of self-sacrifice or a pouring out of His life for our salvation. He washed the feet of His disciples which was the most menial service one man could render to another. Our Lord did these things as an example to us to teach us to take on the burdens of others.

Love does not ask if the other person deserves what we are doing; he may even be a cruel and relentless enemy. Neither does love consider the expense of toil and sacrifice and the suffering that the beloved may cost. It stops at nothing in order to benefit and relieve. Love identifies itself with others so as to suffer their adventures and pains. Herein is the explanation of our missionaries who take on the unpleasant, un- savory and slavish tasks as ministering to the lepers in India or Africa. They pour the water of their lives into the bowls of the hungry and the needy that they may be cleansed in the Blood of Christ.

Do you think their burden is heavy? It is not nearly as heavy as bearing the yoke of our own choosing, the galling yoke of self. You think it is hard to pour out the selfless water to wash the feet of lepers; it is not nearly as hard as living with oneself because of refuses to pour out one's blessings for Christ's sake. Each day, make a little sacrifice for example look in five store windows, but not the sixth, and offer up the mortification of the eyes for the mission. Do without a dessert, or a drink, or a newspaper. Put the savings away, and at the end of the month send them to the Holy Father through his Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Will you become a sacrific- ing servant for the missions as Our Lord became a sacrific- ing servant for your soul?

## Apostles

Last week we discussed our offering "For all the inter- ceptions of the Sacred Heart." The primary intention of the Sacred Heart is the glory of God. Intimately connected with that intention is the sal- vation of souls.

Loving each individual man as he does, God wills his per- fect happiness. But there is no real happiness outside of union with God both in this world and in eternity. Which is another way of saying God wills the salvation of every man.

So if our intention is iden- tified with that of Christ as it is in the morning offering it must include the salvation of the world.

The Apostleship of Prayer is therefore a true apostleship. The word "apostle" is from a Greek word meaning "sent." The apostle is sent on a particular mission. In our sense it is the mission of saving souls, leading them to God through Jesus Christ.

Who are apostles? In the very strictest sense they are the twelve chosen by Christ himself and the bishops and priests who are their suc- cessors. In a lesser but equally real sense all Christians are commissioned to be Apostles when they receive the Sacrament of Confirmation.

By this sacrament we are made soldiers of Christ. We must fight his battles, profess and live our faith, but we are above, we are called to do everything in our power to bring others to Christ.

For some laymen this will take the form of what is known as Catholic Action. Be- cause of time, special talents and special graces, they can take part in the active aposto- late of teaching, catechizing, social work, etc., as con- veyed by various lay organiza- tions under the authority of the bishop.

Obviously not all Catholics are able to take up such an apostleship. According to the late Pope Pius XII, there are two forms of apostleship open to all Catholics, and strictly obligatory for all: namely the apostleship of prayer, and the apostleship of prayer. These do not require extra time nor specialized abilities.

There could be no possible excuse for shirking this re- sponsibility. At the beginning of man's history, the arch- murderer Cain cried out, "Am I my brother's keeper?" Christ answered for God and all mankind when he said through his apostle Paul, "Know you not that you are members one of another?"

What then is the best way we can carry out this aposto- late of prayer and good ex- ample? The word "apostle" XII declared that the best possible way was through a daily offering of self as each and every one of us.

And while we are endeavor- ing to make our daily offer- ing more perfect we are be- coming more and more like Christ. Hence our apostleship becomes that of good example too. Our light shines before men and we radiate the glory of God.
