

# Bishop Kearney To Offer Red Mass For Lawyers

Jurists and attorneys over a seven-county area will attend the annual Lawyers Red Mass to be celebrated by Bishop Kearney in St. Joseph's Church, Rochester, Wednesday, Sept. 14, at 9 a.m.

The Bishop will preach the sermon.

This year the general chairman, Supreme Court Justice Daniel J. O'Mara, is suggesting that all law offices in Rochester and Monroe County be closed until 10 a.m. on the morning of the Mass to give all lawyers and their employees an opportunity to attend the service if they so desire.

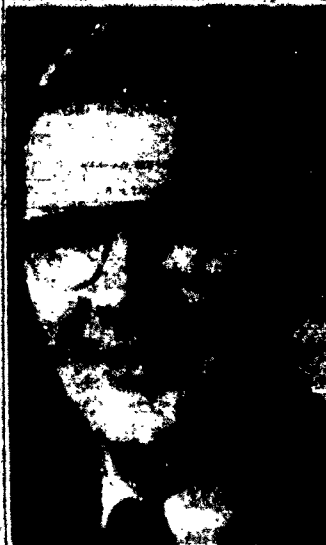

As in past years there will be two divisions of campaign work with women competing

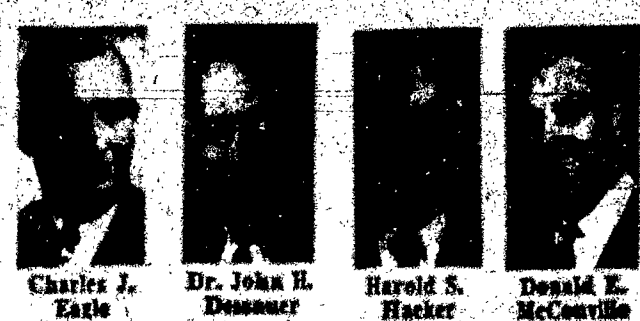

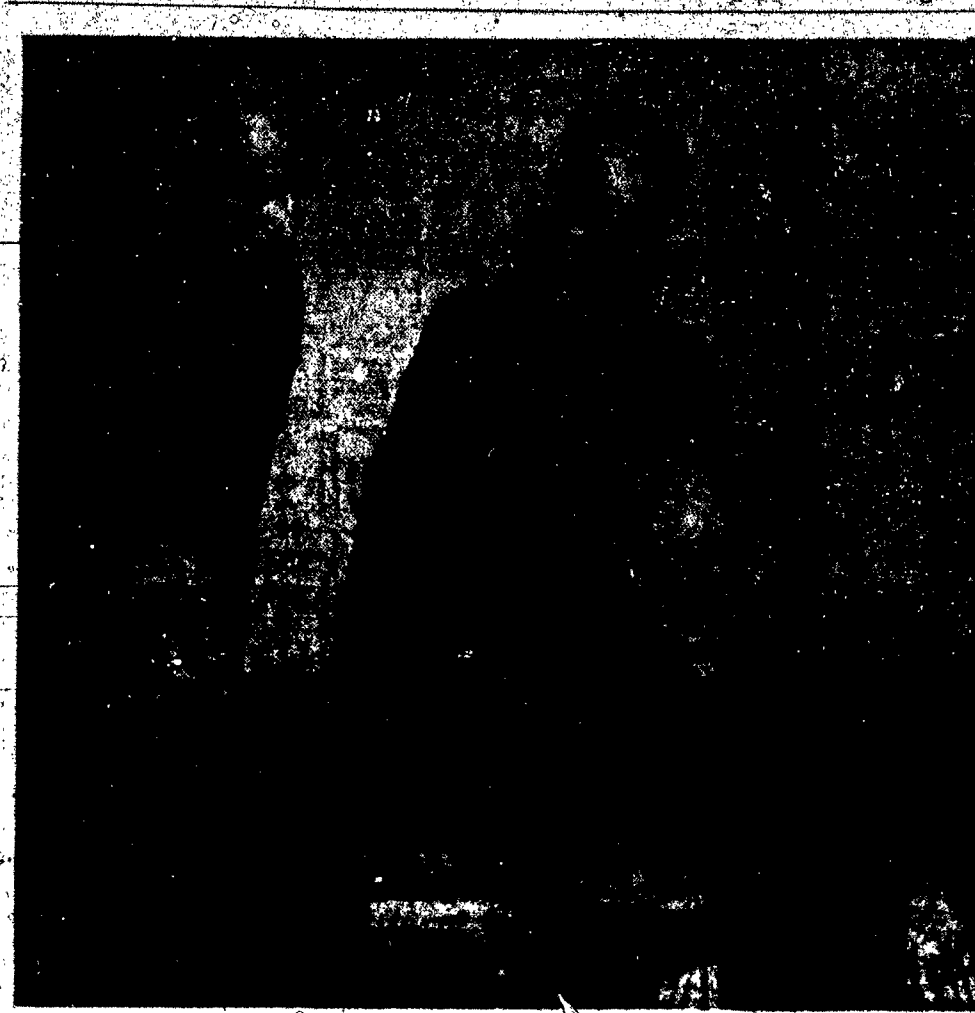
## Webster KC Sets Open House

## 98-Year Old Buffalo Pastor Given Testimonial By Basilian

A very active pastor and two of his former altar boys held a reunion at St. John Fisher College on Wednesday evening, August 31. The Right Rev. Magr. Richard O'Brien, F.A., of Annapolis Church, Buffalo, spent the day with Basilian Fathers Charles Donovan of Aquinas Institute and James Embser of St. John Fisher College.

Monsignor O'Brien is the oldest active priest in the country. A holy gentleman with flashing smile and kindly face, he is still devoting his time and energies to the work of conducting a large urban parish. Each Sunday, he offers two Masses, and still takes his place regularly in the confessional on Saturday afternoon and evening.

**THE MONSIGNOR** was born in 1862, in Albion, during the Civil War days of Lincoln's presidency. When he decided to study for the priesthood, he chose St. Michael's College, conducted by the Basilian Fathers in Toronto.

In reminiscing about this choice, he recalled that a determining factor in making his decision was that tuition and board there was \$160 a year. After completing his studies, he joined the faculty of St. Michael's College, and later taught for a time at another Basilian school, Assumption College in Windsor.

Here he was ordained, on Dec. 21, 1885, by a Basilian, the Most Reverend Dennis O'Connor, C.S.B., then Bishop of London, and later Archbishop of Toronto.
