Named To  
Fisher Staff**

The Rev. Charles J. Lavery, C.S.B., president of St. John Fisher College, has announced the appointment of Dr. Peter Rieser as Associate Professor of Biology for the coming year.

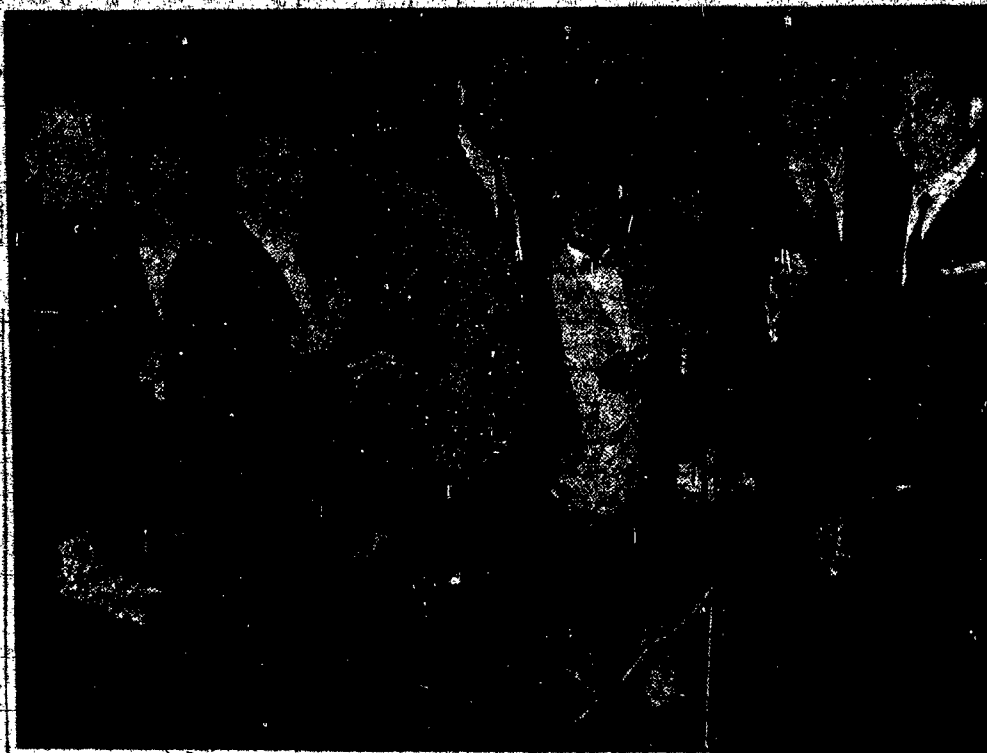
Dr. Rieser was born in Zurich, Switzerland, and immigrated to this country in 1939. He obtained the B.S. at Long Island University, and his Ph.D. at the University of Pennsylvania. He subsequently taught at Fordham University and in the College of Medicine.

State University of Iowa. During the past year, he was Visiting Associate Professor of Biology at Williams College.

THE AUTHOR of several articles in physiological journals, Dr. Rieser is a member of the American Physiological Society, and the Society of General Physiologists. At a September meeting of the latter society, he will deliver a paper based on his recent research, and entitled "Amino Acid Transport in the Human Erythrocyte and its Inhibition by Monosaccharides."

Dr. Rieser's special study has been in the field of cellular physiology and he hopes to continue his research while teaching at St. John Fisher College.

He will reside with his wife and three children at 45 Tremaine Street, Rochester.

**Faith Survives In Moscow**

The Soviet government of Russia has not yet stamped out religion in spite of intensive propaganda and a cruel police state. In Moscow alone over forty Orthodox Churches staffed by Orthodox priests are open for worship.

(New York City, also with a 7 million population, has over 3,500 churches.)

Some churchmen in Russia estimate that there may be fifty million active church members in the USSR.

These facts were made known today in an interview with Rev. Adrian Record, C.S.B., former teacher at Aquinas Institute. The Basilian priest is now professor of psychology at the University of Assumption.

Father Record returned last week from an extensive tour of Asia including a six day visit to Moscow while visiting Russia.

He said that although he was treated with friendliness by citizens and officials alike he was never without a sense of fear and tension. The people to whom he spoke seemed to be continually on edge.

Because the one western rite Catholic church in Moscow was closed due to the illness of the resident priest, Father Louis Dion, A.A., Father Record said Mass in a private chapel in an apartment house.

He said his concept of Russia was greatly altered by his visit. Moscow presented a picture of a modern progressive city. People lived entirely in apartment houses, dressed plainly and seemed to be making many technical advances.

No where in Moscow did he see any signs of discontent, unrest or dissatisfaction.

Although he noticed a marked absence of men and teenagers at religious services he was heartened by the numbers and the devotion of the women and young children.
