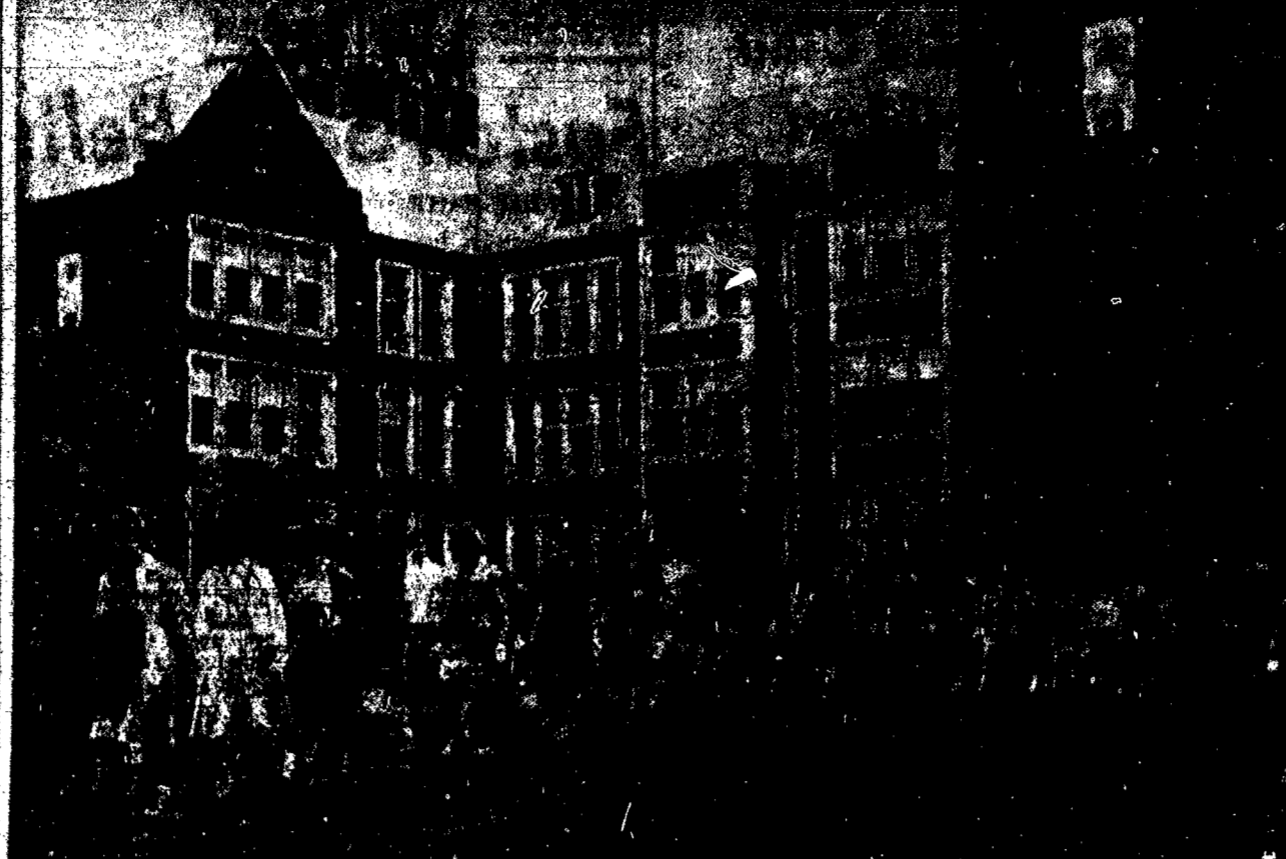

More than 100 resident freshmen and other out-of-town students living off campus in the college area, registered Sunday afternoon, Sept. 11, at Nazareth College.

AS A NEWLY ORDAINED PRIEST

The first parochial assignment of the present Bishop of Trichur in India was to the village of CHERUR, a little hamlet located in the Diocese of Trichur. Only one hundred Catholics comprised the parish when His Excellency was stationed there; today the parish numbers 600 families and it is still growing. The reason for its continuing growth is the fact that the Government has chosen this area to house a Government Training Institute, an Engineering College, and the All-India Radio Station. Father ANTHONY VELLANIPARAMBIL, who is now the pastor of CHERUR, has sought the help of the Bishop in building a new Church, the cost of which will be \$4,000. Since the Bishop is already overburdened with requests for financial help, he has appealed to us. His Excellency writes, "This is where I was first posted. I know their needs. Kindly help them. They are poor and the place has become very important in the civic sense." Can you send a donation to help build this Church in CHERUR?

Harold Driscoll Rites Held At Christ The King

Solemn funeral rites were held for J. Harold Driscoll of Camillus, a former Rochester resident, on Saturday, September 10, at the Church of Christ The King, Irondequoit.

Celebrant of the Mass was Mr. Driscoll's brother-in-law, Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles J. Mahoney, pastor of the Church of Christ The King, assisted by the Rev. Edwin B. Metzger, deacon and the Rev. Joseph Brennan, subdeacon. Also present in the sanctuary was Rev. John Healey.

Mr. Driscoll died unexpectedly Monday, Sept. 5, 1960 in Nova Scotia following the wedding of his son, Dean D. Driscoll. Last rites were administered by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Duffy of Halifax, a guest at the wedding. Mr. Driscoll died a few moments later.

Mr. Driscoll was principal bank examiner for the State Banking Department's Syracuse district. He launched his banking career here about forty years ago with the Union Trust Company. At that time he was a parishioner of St. Margaret Mary's Church and resided in Scholfield Road.

The wedding ceremony in Nova Scotia had been performed by Msgr. Mahoney who had flown there with Mr. and Mrs. Driscoll, accompanied by another son, C. Norman Driscoll of Rochester.

Mrs. J. Harold Driscoll is the former Emeline Mahoney who was once state editor of the Rochester Times Union.

MR. DRISCOLL had been with the State Banking Department about twenty-five years. He was in the Buffalo district and resided in Hamburg, N.Y. until about three years ago.
