Geneva Capuchins Purchase New Jersey Seminary Site

Geneva - Italian - American Branch of the Capuchin Fathers, of which the local Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary is a part, has purchased a 200-acre site about a mile outside Newton, N.J., for a proposed new seminary. Acquisition of the property was announced recently by the officials at St. Lawrence Friary in Beacon. The new site is in a scenic area of northeastern New Jersey.

Contrary to reports, purchase of the new estate apparently does not mean the closing of the local Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary on Lochland Rd. THE REPORT SAID the Newton seminary would replace the Geneva educational institution. In a telephone conversation this week with an official of the St. Lawrence Friary in Beacon, the Geneva Times learned the proposed seminary to be built on the Newton site may be used for a major or a minor seminary. Definite plans for the use of the new structure are incomplete.

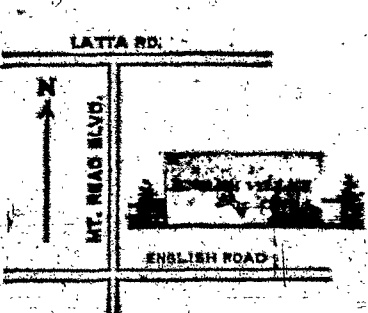
