College Greets Largest Class

Nazareth College welcomed the largest freshman class in its history on Monday morning, September 12, when approximately two hundred and fifty new students gathered for their introduction to college life.

The new class was welcomed by the president and vice-president of the Student Council, Miss Grace Corcoran and W. A. Catherine Barrett, and met some of the members of their "big sister" class. They also were introduced to the faculty members who would be their individual counselors during their first year at Nazareth.

The program continued on Tuesday with a discussion by various aspects of college life. Sister Rose Angela, the dean, pertinent to their departments of the objectives of the college. These were also explained from the students' viewpoint, by a panel of freshmen who were greeted by the chairmanship of Miss Gail Eikensohn.

The new students marched in procession to the Motherhouse Chapel at 11 a.m. where Bishop Kearney offered the Mass of the Holy Spirit. Rev. William Shannon, the college chaplain, spoke to the young women, in an assembly in the auditorium in the afternoon.

THE ORIENTATION program also included a campus tour, luncheon with the junior class, and a song fest and marshmallow roast with them at LePuy Hall on the campus.

The regular college year schedule began on Wednesday when all of the college students reported for classes. Bishop Kearney offered the Mass of the Holy Spirit for the upper classmen on Thursday morning.

College Filled To Capacity

More than 150 resident freshmen and other out-of-town students come from various counties living off campus in the mountains in New York State, college area, registered students including the metropolitan area, Sept. 11, at Nazareth, the North Country, the Southern Tier and central New York.

The demand for resident facilities this year far exceeded the available accommodations. At least forty of the freshmen on the Saint Joseph's League State scholarships, and about the regular reported that no one but high schools are applications from resident who represented in the class, equally distributed after divided between public and Catholic high schools.

Harold Driscoll Rites Held At Christ The King

Solemn funeral rites were held for J. Harold Driscoll of Camillus, a former Rochester resident, on Saturday, September 10, at the Church of Christ the King, Irondequoit.

Cobran of the Mass was Mr. Driscoll's brother-in-law, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles J. Mahoney, pastor of the Church of Christ the King, assisted by the Rev. Edwin B. Metzger, dean and the Rev. Joseph Brennan, subdeacon. Also present in the sanctuary was Rev. John Healy.

Mr. Driscoll died unexpectedly Monday, Sept. 5, 1960 in Nova Scotia following the wedding of his son, Dean D. Driscoll. Last rites were administered by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Duffy of Hallifax, a guest at the wedding. Mr. Driscoll died a few moments later.

Mr. Driscoll was principal bank examiner for the State Banking Department's Syracuse District. He launched his banking career here about forty years ago with the Union Trust Company. At that time he was a parishioner of St. Margaret Mary's Church and resided in Scholfield Road.

The wedding ceremony in Nova Scotia had been performed by Msgr. Mahoney who had flown there with Mr. and Mrs. Driscoll, accompanied by another son, C. Norman Driscoll of Rochester.

Mrs. J. Harold Driscoll is the former Emeline Mahoney who was once state editor of the Rochester Times Union.

MR. DRISCOLL had been with the State Banking Department about twenty-five years. He was in the Buffalo district and resided in Hamburg, N.Y., until about three years ago.
